#### TENNIS TOURNAMENT PLANS ARE OUTLINED

The fourth annual Hood River county junior tennis championships will be held this year from June 8 to June 22 inclusive. Most of the preliminary play will be held on the Benedict Tennis Club courts but the finals will be staged on the Country Club grounds as they provide better accommodations for the large galleries attracted by these events.

Play will be for the Kresse trophy cup for the girls' singles championship, and the Kelly trophy cup for the boys' championships. These cups were donated three years ago by the Kresse Drug Company and the Kelly Hardware Company, respectively, and are held now by Miss Mamie Samuelson and Oliver Samuelson, last year's champions. Miss Lois Jean Sinclair held the Kresse cup in 1922 and Miss Vienna Hukari in 1923. Russell Ahlson won the Kelly cup in 1923. Consolation winners in 1924 were Miss Elizabeth Derby, who won a consolation press given by the Frans Hardware Company, and Edward Naumes, who won the handsome racket put up for this event by Larry Boyd.

Plans are under way to include girls' doubles, boys' doubles, and mixed doubles as well as singles and consolation events in this year's tournaments.

All boys under 16 years of age residing in Hood River county are eligible for the boys' championships. According to the United States National Tennis Association rules any boy who is 16 on the first day of January of the current year is officially 16 for any tournaments held that year, even if he should be 17 the following day. All women and girls residing in the county are eligible for entry in the women's events. The age limit in the men's tourney was placed as this is a junior event only for the boys as all over 16 are permitted to enter the annual men's county tournament.

These tournaments were started four years ago in cooperation with a nation wide movement to popularize tennis in America and have proved increasingly popular. Last year there were more than 70 boys and girls playing in them.

#### GOLDENDALE VOICES BOOST FOR BRIDGE

W. F. Byars, father of Rev. W. N. Byars, and secretary of the Goldendale, Wash., Chamber of Commerce, has given a good boost to the Hood River-White Salmon bridge. The Klickitat County Agriculturist last week carried the following:

Secretary Byars says it is not generally known, and the fact should be advertised, that the shortest and quickest route between Portland and Spokane is by way of the Hood River and White Salmon bridge, Lyle, Goldendale, Bickleton, Mabton, Kennewick-Pasco bridge, and state highway to Spokane. It is 115 miles between Portland and Goldendale, which can be driven in four hours; and 250 miles between Goldendale and Spokane, which can be driven in eight hours. It is easier to drive from Goldendale to Spokane than from Portland to Goldendale, as there are fewer curves to contend with, the most of them being in crossing Rock creek and along the canyon this side of Cleveland—all in Klickitat county. The roads are in excellent condition, being gravelled or paved all the way from the Yakima county line to Spokane. The grader has been run over the road between Goldendale and Bickleton, and when the loose rock are raked out of the road the autolists will have nothing to complain of.

#### Water Users May Get Help

Governor Pierce, at the request of a large number of water users in the Hood River district, last week ordered the attorney general to intervene in a suit involving certain water rights which is to be appealed to the United States supreme court by the Pacific Power & Light company. The suit originally was brought by the Oregon Lumber Co. to restrain the East Fork Irrigation District from using certain waters which the plaintiff corporation declared were necessary for its operations. It was remanded by the court to the state water board, with the result that many other water users affected by the action were brought into the litigation. The state supreme court, in a four-to-three decision, held for the irrigationists against the power and light interests.

#### Cooperation Interests Medford

The largest meeting of growers ever held in Medford convened Saturday to listen to addresses and talks on cooperative marketing, advertising and other topics of interest to producers, over 300 being present. One of the principle talks was by Frank Swett, president of the California Pear Growers Association, who spoke principally on the matter of advertising and the remarkable results obtained and suggested that Oregon growers take action to advertise Oregon pears. The chairman of the meeting, Hamilton Patton, stated a committee would be appointed later to go into the matter.

In addition to Mr. Swett's talk, R. H. Kipp, manager of the marketing department of the Portland Chamber, addressed the meeting on the subject, "Cooperative Marketing." Miscellaneous papers on numerous subjects were also presented.

The meeting was arranged by the new Service Growers' Organization.
