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## MRS. BATES PASSES AT WHITE SALMON

Mrs. Julia Beville Bates, 81, died at the family home, Bardonia Heights district in White Salmon, Monday. She was born near Dayton, O., May 22, 1844, and spent her girlhood in Dayton, where in 1860 she was married to Adolphus Smith Bates upon his return from service in the Civil war. To this union four children were born: Wilmar S., of White Salmon; Colonel Walter T., of Fort Hayes, Ohio; Miss Nancy, of White Salmon; and Richard J. Bates, of Portland. In 1879 the family moved to Minnesota, where they resided until 1882, when they established residence in Fargo, N. D., moving from there in 1885 to St. Paul, Minn., where they resided until 1908, when they came to White Salmon. Mrs. Bates had been ill for several months. Her mother, Nancy Harrison, was a cousin of ex-president Harrison. Mrs. Bates is survived also by a sister, Mrs. M. E. Roberts, of Los Angeles. The body was taken to Portland Tuesday for vault interment at the Portland crematorium, where the body of her husband is interred. Services were held in Portland Tuesday.

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## HOOD RIVER BOWLERS BACK FROM CONGRESS

Hood River bowlers had no reason to be ashamed of their team representation at the Northwest tournament at Aberdeen last week. The team, composed of A. E. Sherrell, D. F. Smith, A. A. Green, H. E. DeWitt and E. B. House, finished 23d out of 80 teams with a total of 2565. This total was well above that of two of the four teams Portland sent to the tournament. The work of "Dad" Smith stood out in the team match as able veterans, the oldest man by many years in the contest, turned in one game of 204 and a three-game total of 699 as his share of the team figure. Scores of the other men were: Sherrell, 407; Green, 506; DeWitt, 454; House, 525.

Sherrell, 507, and House, 502, total 1119, finished 15th in the doubles out of over 100 entries, and House had 598 for 14th place in the singles. Both these scores were well up in the prize list. The team score just failed of entry in the prize money, the 23d team being the last prize winner. Wenatchee Apple Blossoms won the five-man event with 2782, and George Clegg, of Tacoma, finished 23d out of 80 teams with a total of 2565.
