**A. S. KEIR GIVES TENNIS CHAMP CUP**

A splendid trophy cup, a mate to the one given the past week by Dr. C. W. Hamilton, has been given by A. S. Keir to the fourth annual Hood River county tennis tournament committee for a girls' doubles championship award. The cup is of silver, with a dull finish and stands, with its pedestal, about 16 inches high and is beautifully engraved.

Consolation tournaments were begun last year in an effort to encourage beginners and will be a special feature of the play this season. By a careful scrutiny of the draw only the inexperienced players should be eliminated in the singles events in the first round. This leaves all these younger and newer players in a field of their own and a new tournament is drawn for them in which they come into competition with players of approximately their own ability only. Tennis requests will be awarded the winners in these events this year. Trophies for the other tournaments: Kelly cup, for boys' singles; Kresna cup, girls' singles; and Dr. Hamilton cup, for boys' doubles.

**GOLD BEARING ORE SEEMS TO BE RICH**

Joe Lena and Jim Miller, who recently filed on a gold quartz claim on Oak creek, a tributary of the West Fork of Hood river, were here Monday exhibiting ore specimens. The exhibit attracted considerable attention among those familiar with mining, as the ore appeared to be rich. Their claim is the first ever staked on the west base of the mountain. Wallace Moody, who for a number of years has prospected on the east base of the mountain in the vicinity of Lookout mountain, will begin work as soon as the snow will permit the transportation of equipment to stake a shaft on a claim in that vicinity owned by J. K. Morrow, a San Francisco mining man.

**Curfew Will Be Enforced**
