Australian Apples in England The first lot of Australian apples of the 1925 season amounting to 35,000 cases is now on the London market. A preliminary estimate of the supply available for export this season is 1,500,000 cases, as follows: Tasmania, 1,000,000 cases; western Australia, 250,000 cases; Victoria, 250,000 cases; south Australia, 250,000 cases. Exports last season amounted to approximately 1,000,000 cases, as compared with 1,821,000 cases in 1924. The Australian export case contains one bushel of apples.

Released on Bail Corbett Underwood, arrested some time ago with Waldo Mohr and lodged in the county jail at The Dalles on an alleged assault and battery charge has posted \$750 bail and been released. His case will come before the next session of the Waco county grand jury. Underwood and Mohr are accused of severely beating Joe Miller, Hood River lumberjack, and robbing him of about \$50 in cash and a gold watch. Mohr is still in jail awaiting the action of the grand jury.
