Notice of Street Improvements

WEST CASCADE AVENUE

Pursuant to the order of the Common Council, Ordinance No. 682 of the City of Hood River, Oregon, passed by the Common Council, May 4th, 1925, and approved by the Mayor May 11, 1925, notice is hereby given that the undersigned City Recorder will receive bids for the following improvement:

Cascade Avenue in the City of Hood River, Oregon, from a southerly projection of the West Line of 314 South Street across said Cascade Avenue, west for a distance of about 1200 feet to the end of the Columbia River Highway pavement by filling and grading to grade, by constructing surface water drains, constructing retaining walls, constructing guard fences and laying down and constructing a concrete pavement thereon and surfacing with gravel and broken stone.

All work incidental to the construction and laying down of said pavement, such as grading and constructing water drains, shall be done if any such is needed, and the location, dimensions, location and manner of constructing or making each part of said improvements shall be strictly in accordance with the plans and specifications of the City Engineer, which are the standard specifications of the State Highway Department for concrete pavement.

Sealed proposals for the work will be received at my office up to 6 o'clock p. m. June 1st, 1925, and the Common Council will at its next regular meeting after the completion of the publication of this notice, to-wit: On the 1st day of June, 1925, at the Council Chamber at the hour of 8 o'clock p. m. proceed to open and consider all bids for said work, which is ordered by the Common Council by said Ordinance No. 682, duly enacted as above specified; that the improvement will be let in one contract, and will be required to be completed within thirty (30) days from the date of the awarding the same to the successful bidder, who will be required to furnish a bond to the City of Hood River in the sum of not less than 25 per cent of the estimated cost of the contract for the faithful performance thereof; that complete specifications are on file in my office covering the improvements for which bids are called, which may be examined by prospective bidders upon application, and said contracts will be awarded to the lowest and best bidder upon said specifications.

The City reserves the right to reject any or all bids, or to waive any defects therein, for the benefit of the City of Hood River. The terms of the specifications shall be notice to prospective bidders of the requirements demanded by said City in the performance of said work.

This notice is given for ten days by publication in the Hood River Glacier, a newspaper published at the City of Hood River, Oregon, the date of the first publication being the 14th day of May, 1925.
