REPORTS ON FROST DAMAGE-ORIGIN IN

That shipments from all over the United States to May 2 were 50 per cent compared with 1924. The same was true last year. It is believed that there was over 2,000 tons less in volume and, in that time, the number shipped after May 2 had risen to the same of the season. There are only about 2,000 tons of boxes, apples left, and it is estimated that the barrel stock will not be as great as last year.

Washington's apple shipments to May 2 were \$4,422,000; New York follows with \$1,550,000; Virginia with \$1,200,000; Oregon with \$1,000,000; California with \$800,000; West Virginia seventh with \$350,000; and Arkansas eighth with \$250,000.

Frosting weather was reported from the fruit belt of Western Washington just when the apple and pear orchards were in full bloom. Consequently the damage was done to the crop, though just how much it was impossible to determine, according to reports published in the Pecker. The mercury hovered around the freezing point for five consecutive days.

White injury and frost damage is reported in various parts of British Columbia, especially to fruit. In the vicinity of Oregon government fruit experts report that there will be very little fruit grown this year, due to winter damage. Winter injury and spring frost damage was reported from Kelowna, Sumas, and Vernon and Penticton, though the latter district suffered less than others. The extent of the damage cannot yet be estimated according to a bulletin issued by the Canadian Pacific Railway.

WRITER OF TRAVEL BOOK IS VISITOR

M. J. Lorraine, veteran civil engineer, whose life has been spent largely in laying out transportation routes, lines and who celebrated his 60th birthday in 1921 by setting out on a trip down the Columbia river, from the source to the Pacific ocean in a row boat, was here last week displaying a book of his journey, "The Columbia River," which he visited Hood River in late autumn of 1921, having successfully shot many rapids, a feat that was declared impossible before he undertook the journey, traveling through the wildest and most beautiful scenery.

Mr. Lorraine has placed his book, which is profusely illustrated, in the hands of the northwest. The Canadian Pacific, Union Pacific and Great Northern railway companies have ordered copies of the volume, he said.

Mr. Lorraine, whose home is now in Alhambra, Calif., has called his volume, "The Columbia Unveiled." He gives an entertaining, educational and interesting account of the country through which he traveled on his courageous journey. He pays his respects to the Hood River valley and Mount Hood, declaring that Mount Hood is one of the most alluring snow-peaks on the globe.

"The Columbia Unveiled" is a book that is worth while if one is interested in adventure and pioneering. It is the work of an engineer, and who retains the spirit of youth although gone the advanced years of three score and ten. It is worth while as an educational volume.

SNOW ON HERMAN COLUMBIA RIVER DEEP

R. W. Whitcomb, ranger at the Herman station near Cascade Locks, who was here Friday, stated that the Eagle creek trail to Wahtonah Falls would be open for traffic yesterday. A number of feet of snow has been on the trail for several weeks removing it has been about a half mile south of the Eagle creek where snow covered the trail. The snow was caused during the heavy snow following the December below weather. Huge masses of ice formed above the trail. These tumbled down, and avalanches were warm weather snowed them.

"From Wahtonah Falls to the summit on the Herman creek trail," said Mr. Wheeler, "one still encounters snow from foot to 10 feet deep. The snow-fall in the mountains was much greater or the past winter than I had anticipated until I made the trip in to Wahtonah like the first of the week."
