City Streets Will Be Oiled

Residents on west Oak, west State and Tenth street, between State and Cascade avenues have petitioned the city council to alleviate the dust nuisance by applying oil on the macadam surface of the thoroughfares. The petition was presented following a conference with Divisional State Highway Engineer Warner, of The Dalles, who agreed to furnish equipment of the state highway department, now being used in oiling the Mount Hood Loop highway and apply the oil on the city streets at cost. The streets are all feeders of the Columbia River highway.
