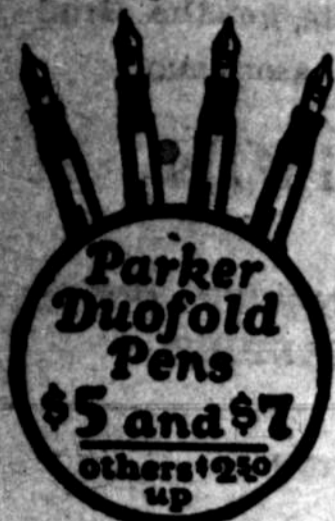

Bilmer Root came up from Portland Friday to attend the operetta.

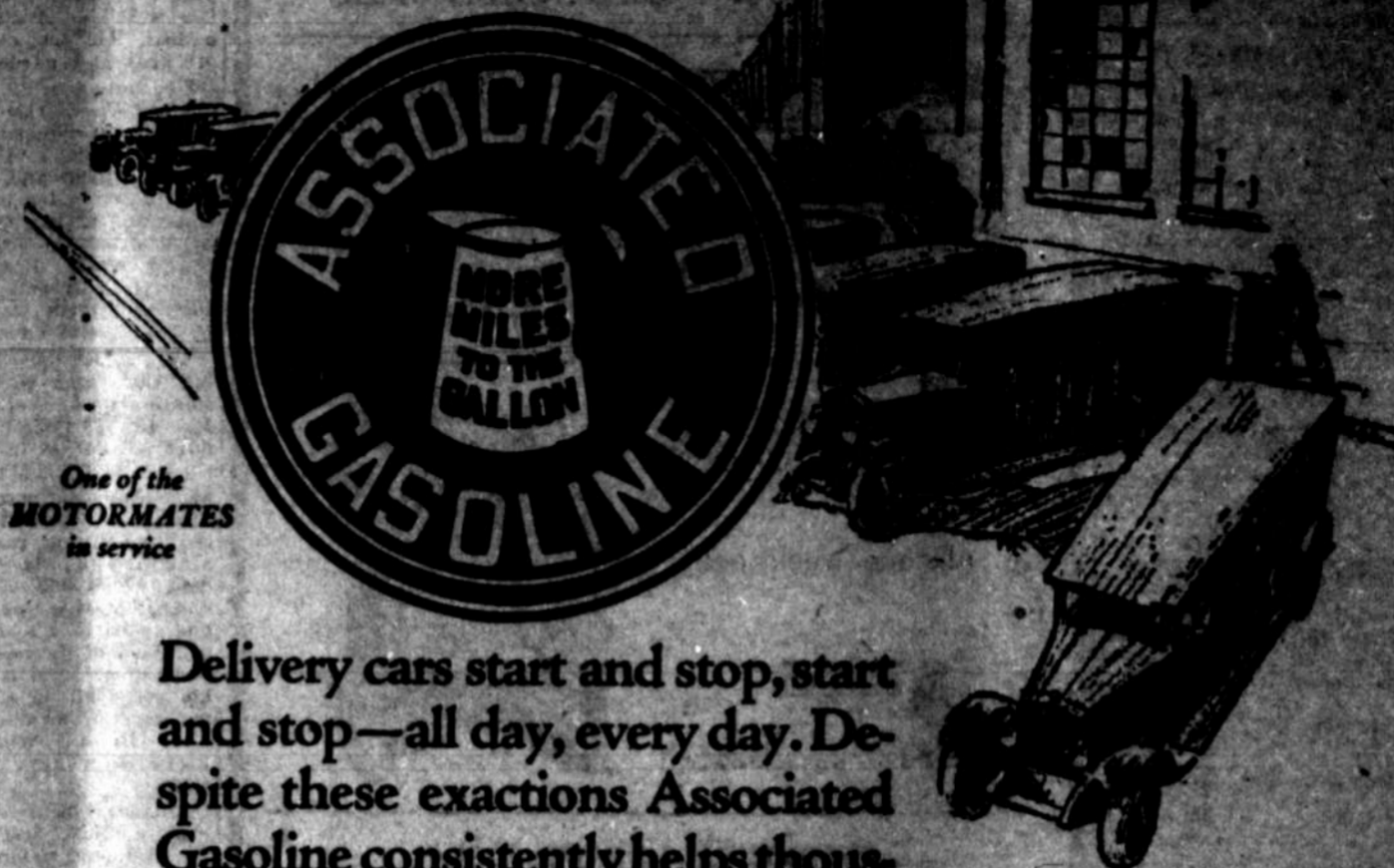
