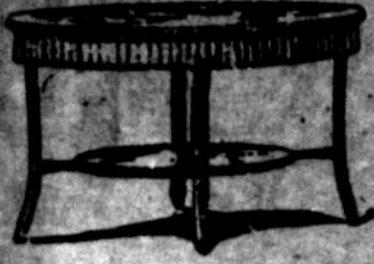

WHITE SALMON

Heavy showers, which have prevailed throughout this district during the past week, caused with a damp atmosphere Thursday, Friday morning the government thereabouts on Sunday registered 80 above. Although the stage of water in the Columbia is unusually high at this time, no particular damage has resulted and no apprehension is felt over the outcome with the advent of hot weather, although the water is a little bit too close to the lower orchards and garden tracts for comfort.

John C. Clarkson, aged 73, died recently in Vancouver, Wash. His obituary was published in the Hood River News. He was a former resident of White Salmon and was a member of the Masonic lodge here. His eyesight was destroyed a few years ago by a dynamite explosion near Vancouver, Wash. Besides his widow, he is survived by two daughters and one son. Interment was held in L. O. O. F. cemetery Wednesday.

Col. C. Russell, Blingen's enterprising cash and carry merchant, has sold out to A. G. Lewis, of Glenwood. Mr. Russell's plans for the future have not as yet been made public. Captain E. W. Spencer, ex-Columbia steamboat man, who with Mrs. Spencer has established residence for the summer on their beautiful place near Husum, is reconstructing his dam, which has suffered considerable damage during the past six months, and putting his electric generating plant out of commission. The captain recently suffered a painful injury to his leg, straining a tendon and almost putting the member out of commission. He left White Salmon Friday for a three days' visit to the Rose City.

Commencement exercises of the class of 1923, first to graduate from the Columbia union high school, were held here Friday. Seventeen pupils received diplomas. The commencement address was made by Dr. Frederick E. Bolton, University of Washington. The class motto is: "Not to equal but to excel"; class flower, red rose buds (very appropriate for the feminine members); class colors, maroon and gold. We wish them boys and girls Godspeed in their future undertakings. Some will enter college, others will establish homes of their own. Next Friday, next week. This district appreciates the enterprise displayed by Horticultural Inspector Elms, Skamania county, who has installed a high grade thermometer.

From May 25 to 30 all will purchase the flaming poppy to aid the American Legion in their big campaign.

The Deckerts formerly resided in White Salmon, and Mrs. Deckert at one time operated a general merchandise store at Blingen.

A baseball benefit will be given at the Dewey theatre Thursday, today. A big special attraction has been secured for this occasion and Hood River and vicinityites are cordially invited to attend. G. L. Colburn, of the Colburn hotel, is not afflicted with hives, but prior to the sale of his Pleasant View ranch four swarms of bees landed on the place within a few days. Later he received word that a colony had taken up quarters on his property on Main street. The youngsters (four in all) are now calling the ex-mayor "Honey."

Evan Childs Post No. 87, American Legion, will conduct services at L. O. O. F. cemetery Saturday at 10 a. m. Prof. Ellis H. Rogers, of Tacoma, will be the speaker of the day. Business houses will remain closed during the services.

Cadet Eugene Glader, son of A. E. Glader, Burdell mountain rancher, won a marksman's medal in target practice during the cadet encampment at Rock Point, the future site of the Hill Military Academy just outside of the city limits at Portland. The medal was presented Friday.

Elms Emma Owen, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Owen, of the Washington hotel here, died at her home May 10 at the age of 21 years. She was born at Fossil, Ore., May 14, 1894, and came to White Salmon with her parents at the age of three years. She graduated from the White Salmon high school with the class of 1922. Prior to her illness she was employed by the Gladden Motor Co. She was a member of the White Salmon Circle Women of Woodcraft, and also Good Will Bethel lodge. Services and interment were held here May 21.

The annual meeting of the pioneers of Camas Prairie and vicinity will be held at Blingen June 12. The business session will be held during the morning followed by a big luncheon dinner at noon. After this event, if the crowd can keep awake, the Blingen Commercial club will stage an entertainment and a dance will be given during the evening. Watch for "Moe-rain."

Tucker, in the operation of El Corregidor orchards. Mrs. Frey was formerly Miss Regina Frey, of Kansas City. Mr. and Mrs. Frey returned to the coast by way of the Grand Canyon and southern California.

El Corregidor has been developed into one of the most imposing Upper Valley fruit estates. Recently Mrs. Tucker acquired an additional 50 acres from E. O. McCombs. The new property is located at a higher altitude, and with it was acquired valuable water rights.
