County Health Notes

The campaign for membership in the Public Health association will be launched in the city next week. The Campaign Girls will aid the local committee, and all families are asked to have their money ready when the girls call. The local committee consists of the following: Mrs. C. E. Parliash, chairman; Mrs. A. B. Keir, educational; Mrs. L. M. Bentley, publicity; Mrs. B. B. Perigo, nurse, and Mrs. P. L. Manser, finance.

No clinics will be held in the city until July. Clinics will be held in the latter half of June and in early July at the following places: Odell, Dee, Pine Grove, Parkdale and Cascade Locks.

Mr. Hood and Middle Valley districts were the first to report in the health campaign. Both sections went over 100 per cent.

County Health Nurse Whitteker says that it is difficult to get little boys interested in such work as a health program is erroneous. She tells of a small boy in school last fall who weighed only 50 pounds, far under weight. When she first approached him he apparently had made up his mind that he would always be skinny. He told him that he would not get any muscle unless he first got flesh on his arms, and that when he grew older he would have to watch the other boys play baseball and football while he sat on the sidelines.
