TAX OF STORED APPLES HURTS SALES

Fruit shippers of the Spokane district, and their Chamber of Commerce, expect to join with the Yakima and Wenatchee districts in an effort to relieve Washington apple men of a taxation law that is said to hamper marketing. It was decided to send a representative to a state meeting to be called by Wenatchee and Yakima shippers.

The complaint of the Washington shippers is that the law provides that apples in storage March 1 are to be taxed as personal property, but that in other states the apples can be stored without such a charge. The result is that in an effort to avoid the tax, the last of February the fruit is shipped out when the market is not ready for it and prices consequently suffer.

Orderly marketing requires cold storage at points of origin of the fruit and shipping as the market requires, according to the general belief of the northwestern shippers.

"Wincaps, the most profitable variety, and the bulk of the northwest crop, are not ready for marketing until after March 1," W. F. Romans, secretary of the agricultural bureau of the Spokane Chamber of Commerce, said. "The tax can be avoided by shipping them to the east at once after they are picked, but that method is unscientific, a great number of experiments have proved. Investigations by the Department of Agriculture show it is best to put the apples in cold storage immediately after they are picked, and that a great deal of spoiling results from shipping when the fruit has not been precooled."

"For several years there has been a movement to encourage building cold storages in the fruit districts, but the taxation feature discourages building."

Three methods of getting around the March 1 taxation were seen; one is to take a test case to the United States supreme court. The second is to get the legislature to change the date of assessing personal taxes or abolition of tax on stored apples entirely, or to induce the state association of county assessors to take the initiative on bringing about a change.

REESE & FOSTER HAVE BUSY PLACE

Reese & Foster, skilled concrete and cement workers, have established a new concrete block and tile works on Cascade avenue. The men make both stamped and pressed blocks and tile. They make a specialty of the manufacture of large tiles for chimney construction. The tile is so made that air space is provided between the inner and outer walls of the chimney.

The manufacturers make sewer, drainage and irrigation tile. Local orchardists utilize concrete pipe in most of their extension of irrigation distributing lines. They manufacture concrete brick, which is becoming constantly more popular.

The manufacturers are agents for various kinds of fire brick, stove, tapestry and finishing brick.

Porter King, inspector for the forestry department, who was here last week, joining C. E. Barnes, deputy state warden, on a tour of local sawmills, declared that he was well pleased with local conditions.

Mr. King said he found mill owners, timber owners and ranchers whose places all border the forested area all willing to cooperate in every way in the prevention of forest fires.

A Visit at the Durant Factory

An ancient proverb states, "One picture is worth more than 10,000 words." A view of the significant operations at the Durant factory at Oakland confirm it. The individual in passing through and carefully inspecting each operation can judge the quality of the output as he could in no other way. A short educational course in motor cars is given to the visitor who passes through the plant. The wheel room is one's initiation to motor car building. Here wheels are being received in quantity shipments, all painted with a preliminary protective coat to prevent rust and preserve the natural grain from damage during transit. After inspection for flaws these wheels are sprayed, sanded, painted with two coats of ground color, resanded and finished, then inspected.

Then one passes to the body room and sees more inspections of hardwood parts and panels of sheet metal. One sees the working of the body fligs, accurately fitted and set to receive body parts, and the building of standardized and sturdy units, each of the very same dimensions as the preceding one. The sparkling and glowing of the spot welding machines, intrigue one as panels or parts are fitted and fused into one solid piece of metal—this to prevent any possible chance of loosening under wear as screw and nut construction does.

When door frames are fitted with hinges and locks, and the careful door hangers perform their important tasks and all metal is buffed off with emery the inspector who checks over every inch of space, marking dents or rough spots, makes you realize that here is a car that is being built, not just thrown together. At this point the escalator delivers the bodies to the painting department on the second floor.
