WASCO PIONEER, 92, DIES AT THE DALLES

Joshua E. Hardy, 92 years old. The Dalles' oldest ploneer, died last Thursday morning, after declining health for several years, due to old

age.

Active until a few years ago, "Uncle Josh," as he was known, had made provisions for the care of his body after death. Five years ago he left money for his funeral expenses and clothing to be interred in with Mrs. Lulu D. Crandall.

Hardy first saw the frontier town of Fort Dallas in 1852, when, as a member of a wagon train, captained by R. C. Gridley, he arrived in The Dalles over the Oregon trail from the middle west. He was 20 years old at

Going on to the Willamette valley Hardy settled in Linn county, at Brownsville. There he made the acquaintance of Z. F. Moody, who was a business man at Brownsville at that time. This friendship was renewed at Salem when Moody was governor, and when the Moody gubernatorial mansion was built in 1885 Hardy did the fine painting on it. Hardy returned to The Dalles in 1878, when he renewed his friendship with Moody. He was both a painter and an artist and besides painting most of the early buildings of the section, and the steamhoats which operated on the upper Columbia river,

operated on the upper Columbia river. he produced many good canvases. He was a familiar character in The Dalles and took keen interest in organization and work of the Old Wasco Pioneers' association.

Hannibal, Mo., was Hardy's birth-place. His father was Casper Hardy, of Georgetown, Ky.

Nancy Jane Tullis-Hardy, wife of the deceased pioneer, is interred in the G. A. R. cemetery at The Dalles. She was a Civil war nurse and the only woman with a record of service the struggle between the north and the south, ever to reside in The Dalles. "Uncle Josh" will be buried by her side.

Sulfur Prevents Canning

"Don't spray fruit designed for the cannery with sulfur-bearing sprays," cannery with sulfur-bearing sprays," is the word being sent growers by the horticultural products section of the Oregon Agricultural College. The reasons for the warning are that sulfur on the fruit in any form is detrimental to canned products, and some Oregon growers faced with the prospect of loss from brown rot on sweet cherries and prunes are tempted to conries and prunes are tempted to con-trol the rot with dusting sulfur. This practice is said by the station to be all right for fruits intended for use fresh or in some form other than canning. Growers wanting information on control of the brown rot by means other than sulfur are invited to write the department of plant pathology for directions.
