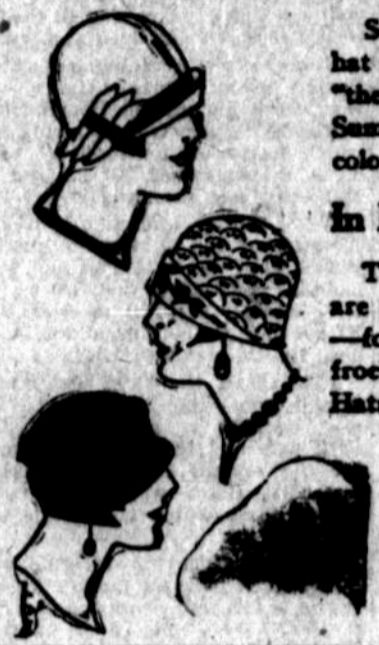

The first big Scout event of the summer season will be held next Tuesday afternoon, on the high school field, in the form of a Boy Scout race meet.
