A party of high officials of the Pacific Fruit Express, en route to Walla Walla, Wash., by automobile, while here Saturday announced that bids had been called for on construction of a concrete storage plant to be erected along the O-W-R & N. track east of the city. The plant, which will be utilized for icing refrigerator cars, will have a capacity of 2,000 tons. It will be operated by the Apple Growers Association, which has a contract with the company to furnish it ice for all "reefers" loaded here.

Members of the party included: H. Giddings, vice president and general manager, and H. T. White, assistant general manager, of the Northwest Ice & Cold Storage Co., and M. E. Whitbread, superintendent of Portland, and J. B. Crawford, assistant general manager, of Chicago.

L. F. SMITH SAYS MEDFORD CROP FINE

L. F. Smith, formerly manager of local orchard properties, who now has charge of the big Gies Bros. orchards at Medford, while here over the week end on a visit, stated that he anticipates a crop of 65,000 boxes of Newtown apples and 2,000 boxes of pears this season. Mr. Smith, trained in the Hood River method of caring for orchards, declared that the system used here in controlling codling moth is much superior to that used ordinarily by Medford growers.

"In the Gies Bros. orchard," said Mr. Smith, "worm damage last year reached 65 per cent. This year, however, I have applied four double strength arsenate of lead sprays, and our apples are free from worms.

"The Medford apple and pear crops generally will be good this season," Mr. Smith was accompanied here by his bride.
