#### CREWS HAVE BEGUN OILING LOOP ROAD

Crews of the state highway department began at Parkdale Monday to apply oil to the surface of the Mount Hood Loop Highway. They stated that they expect to meet another crew, starting on the south side of the mountain in the White River district. The application of the oil, which will soak in rapidly during the hot, dry weather, will seal the Loop road within the Mount Hood national forest turned into a dustless boulevard.

Doggett & Cooper, Upper Valley men, have been awarded the contract for rock surfacing the Cooper Spur later in the Loop road. J. F. Thompson, here Tuesday from the Upper Valley, stated that the men are now in central Oregon. They expected, he said, to secure equipment near Bend that will be large enough to allow them to complete the work in 45 days. When the road is rooled, a smooth, well drained highway, an easy grade, will be available to a point near the snowline at Cloud Cap Inn.

The Hood River post of the American Legion, the members of which were active in securing the lateral road, will postpone the celebration of the Cooper Spur route until their annual ascent of Mount Hood next summer. Because of the construction work this year's climbing party will be limited.
