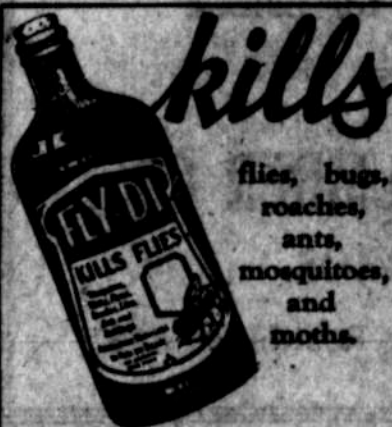

# BILLY SUNDAY GIVES MODERNISTS RAP

Evolutionists and modernists, Billy Sunday, noted evangelist, declared Sunday, were trying to destroy belief in the divinity of Christ and church of God and substitute religion suitable to their purposes. He characterized them as a pack of fabricators. In the plain language of Mr. Sunday, these modernists are "Hars." Christianity and the Christian church, he asserted, must stand or fall on the miraculous birth and divinity of Christ, and its fall is something that will never take place.

Shouting that he would fight to the last ditch any man, whether he had "D. D. L. D. or P. I. X. before or behind his name," who denied the immaculate conception and the divine birth of Christ, he jumped to the front of the platform, assumed the position of a ballplayer about to make a long throw, and barked: "My friends, for eight years I played professional baseball and, believe me, I can throw the pill some yet. I wish I could have been around when those men were trying to pit the skirts under Christ. I'd have sent some of them away in the Red Cross wagons."

The Astory Methodist church, where Mr. Sunday played the preliminary revival game prior to opening his seven-week series in Portland in September, was filled to overflowing. In the congregation there were residents from almost all parts of the Washington section and number from Portland and other points equally as far away.

Looking slightly older, but with all the old-time pep that characterized Billy when he was a star performer with the Chicago White Sox in the days of Pop Anson, this human dynamo went furiously to bat against old man sin and his cohorts. The last note of the opening hymn had scarcely died away when the militant defender of Christ and his teachings sprang to the platform and began his sermon, saying:

"What think ye of Christ? The church of God must stand or fall on the belief in the divinity of Christ. And Christ was divine. We have the Bible and the prophets to prove it. Eight hundred years before the coming of Christ the manner of his birth and his place in the world as the son of God was prophesied in the Bible, and also the events that followed in his after life. And yet the evolutionists and modernists try to tell us that man descended from a monkey."

"Any man that tells me that I or my ancestors descended from a monkey or any other prehensiled, tailed animal," roared this latter day sportsman of Christianity, "is a 'braying jackass' and wants to pry God off his throne. Those people who today do not want to defend the church and the Bible and the virgin birth of Christ are curs, and I'll tell them to whether they button their collars in front or in the back. The Bible is the inspired word of God, whether we can comprehend it all or not. God is so big and so great that he doesn't have to explain all his doings to suit like an actor can't understand him. Neither can the little child understand what we grown-ups can."

The martyrs who died deaths of torture rather than renounce their belief in the divinity of Christ, were put forth strongly as evidence by the Rev. Billy that they were inspired by God and were making their sacrifice forever to carry on the truth of his miraculous birth.

The baseball evangelist assailed what he termed social service workers and the big universities of the country, stating that this organization and these institutions were not attempting to make Christians. They were attempting, he asserted, to save what they called society by the higher education route, which was taking those who imbibed their teachings farther and farther away from God and Christ. To save the individual from sin and a godless life, he declared, this type of education, he said, the devil had chained to his throne.

Rev. Sunday interrupted his sermon by laying the Hood River folk to his Portland evangelistic sermons. "I am going to have a Hood River day," said Mr. Sunday, "and I want at least 500 of you to come down that day, just to show those Portland folk that we raise something here in Hood River besides apples."

It was a union service Sunday, and other churches of the city closed for the event, their ministers attending. Rev. W. O. Livingstone pronounced the invocation. Rev. C. R. Delepine gave a scripture reading, and Rev. Sunday was introduced by Rev. W. N. Byars.

The rumor here last week that Rev. Sunday might touch on the evolutionist-antirealist camp Sunday piqued the interest of many. When called at his Odell home Thursday Mr. Sunday was busy, despite the temperature of 95 degrees, helping a hay baling crew. Mrs. Sunday answered the telephone. "The Scopes case isn't worrying Mr. Sunday," declared Ma Sunday. "Naturally, he follows the newspaper accounts, relating the tilts of the lawyers, with some interest. But it is not interesting him as much as big baseball series."

At the talk, however, Mrs. Sunday saw her noted husband pass the window on the way to get a refreshing draught of cold water, and she called him in to talk for himself. "I do not know that I'll mention the Scopes case in my sermon Sunday," said the evangelist. "I may, and if I do you may rest assured that I'll say my respects to those who advance the theory that man has come up from a protoplasm. This is a Christiana nation. The pilgrim forefathers came here to make it that. The evolutionists are anti-Christian. I agree with Bill Byars. Indeed, I think the Scopes case is going to be a farce, according to Mr. Sunday. Those who oppose the law that the good folk of Tennessee have adopted, he said, have a leg to stand on. For the prohibition of the teaching of evolution, he declared, is backed by a law and binding law and by the fundamentalism of Christianity itself. Mr. Sunday predicted that the decision will have no show in the Tennessee court or any other."

Recruiting Office Moved

# OILED APPLE WRAPS ARE TO BE TESTED

The staff inspection office of Hood River has made arrangements for the testing of the amount of oil in the apple wraps that are to be used in the coming season. This was done by W. J. Koster, fruit inspector, who is in charge of inspection. He states that general observations last year were that the amount of oil in various lots of paper varied considerably. It was desired that the amount of oil be accurately determined and that the use of wraps with insufficient oil be discouraged on apple varieties which are subject to storage scald.

To this effect, D. F. Fisher, pathologist, U. S. D. A., Wenatchee, Wash., states that 14-pound paper should contain not less than 15 per cent oil and 12-pound paper not less than 17 per cent oil by weight. The type of oil used is also important and this will be checked upon as far as possible.

Last season in many instances growers and dealers were disappointed with the results obtained because of the failure of oiled paper to prevent storage scald on Newtown apples. This is true of the Newtowns which were held in both common and cold storage. Thus the method of handling and the rapidity of which the fruit is picked and packed after maturity is very important, but in many instances where all of these precautions were taken, scald developed far too early in the storage life of the Newtowns.

It is felt that if growers are to receive the full value of the oiled paper there must be a local determination of the oil content of this paper. With this in view the inspection service has obtained a chemical balance and other necessary equipment to make this determination. This will avoid the delay which would occur if the paper had to be sent to an outside place for the determination.

Since the oil content of paper will decrease when the paper is held for any length of time, it is suggested that any oil paper which might be held over from last season, not be used on late keeping varieties of apples which are subject to storage scald. This hold over paper should be used on the earlier varieties. For the assistance in obtaining the necessary chemical equipment and information the fruit inspection office expresses its appreciation to the chemistry department of the Oregon Agricultural College.

# BOY SCOUT NEWS

Lumberport, the summer camp for the Boy Scouts of Hood River valley and The Dalles, located on Lost Lake, will be one of the finest Boy Scout summer camps in the northwest according to plans of the Mid-Columbia Council, camp committee, which last week adopted the recommendations for developing the camp made by Clark Schouboe, Scout executive.

The camp will have a capacity of approximately 50 boys, to be housed in tents, four boys to the tent, with bunk and floor built to insure comfort in case of bad weather. This feature has been provided because the camp will be open from July 18 to August 22. Scouting and scoutcraft will be featured at the camp this summer, according to Mr. Schouboe, and ample opportunities will be provided for all boys to pass their required Scout tests. The motto of the camp is "Every boy advanced a grade in scouting while in camp." Swimming, lifesaving and boating are other attractive features that will make Lumberport particularly attractive to Hood River boys. A swimming director will be at the camp all the time to assist the executive in this branch of scouting. Additional emphasis will be placed on physical development.

The camp is ideally located on the south corner of the lake, where it is practically always swept by the cooling lake breeze. Mosquitoes and other pests are seldom bothersome at this point because of the wind, and the lake shore is so gradual in its slope that in over two acres of water immediately in front of the camp, bottom can be reached by an average sized boy.

Close cooperation with the Portland Council Scout camp at Wahtum lake, 11 miles away by forest trail, has been arranged between Scout Executive Oberhauser, of Portland, and Mr. Schouboe. Overland hikes between the two camps will be an interesting variation from the day's program.

Registration for the camp will open this week, at The Dalles office of the Boy Scouts of America. Application cards may be obtained from Scoutmasters by any boys, whether they are scouts or not, providing they are 12 years old, or more. Boys may come in for any period of a week or more.

Mr. Blythe of Encampment (From Oregon City Enterprise)

Samuel F. Blythe, former newspaper man, now retired and making his home at Hood River, is one of the interesting visitors in this city attending the encampment. Mr. Blythe has made his home in that corner for the past 45 years, and no man is better and more favorably known than this Civil War veteran.

Mr. Blythe, who was born in Pennsylvania, enlisted at Boston, O., in the 62nd Ohio regiment. He was with that regiment for three years and three months, and re-enlisted at Boston in Hascock's veteran corps, serving another year, making a total of four years and three months in the army. He fought in the battle of Fort Donelson, Shiloh, Siege of Corinth, Battle of Corinth, Vicksburg, Capture of Little Rock and many skirmishes. In the battle of Corinth he had a gun shot out of his hand, a portion of his coat having been struck by another shell, narrowly missing his leg.

Mr. Blythe came west in 1853, crossed the plains from Montana, after making his home in that state for three months. He then came to California for one year and came to Oregon in 1870, marrying in Portland in 1872, later engaging in the newspaper business at Hood River. In 1883, Mr. Blythe, when a lad of 14 years, began to set type in the office of the Franklin Repository, a newspaper of Ohio, still in existence, and now 128 years old. He visited his newspaper friends in this city. Mr. Blythe, who has been a member of the Grand Army since 1881, is a member of Clatsop post of Hood River, and is also post department commander of the Grand Army.
