U. F. Boosts Oregon Scenery

LESTER ISSUES WARNING AGAINST FIRE

In a chalet address Tuesday night Deputy State Fire Marshall Lester, of Portland, urged the folk of Odell, where a centralization of residences and fruit warehouses has been taking place for a number of years, to secure a water supply sufficient for fire protection. Mr. Lester warned all citizens of the city and valley to use every precaution to guard against fire through the dry season. Several rural fires the past week have stimulated activities here looking toward the cooperation of the city and county for more adequate protection of rural and suburban property. At present a chemical truck of the city fire department responds to rural calls, but Mr. Lester stated that this protection should be augmented by a water supply at such central points as Odell.

NEWS OF THE GOLFERS

Twenty-five men and six women qualified for the annual club championship tournament of the Hood River Golf Club last Sunday. W. F. Mears and Dr. C. W. Hamilton, each with a medal score of 79, led the field for the men, while Mrs. C. W. Hamilton turned in a tie 87 for the women, with Mrs. H. T. DeWitt second with 81.

Pairings for the first match round in the first 16 of the men's section have been made as follows, these matches all to be completed by the evening of July 12: Mears vs. J. Ansel; Hamilton vs. Childs; House vs. Murphy; Rooker vs. Piers; Crew vs. Nichols; Peeters vs. Collier; DeWitt vs. Pooley; Jenkins vs. Banks.

The defeated eight of these men will form the first flight of eight and will be immediately paired for the first round match play as soon as the first round is completed. The winning eight will form the championship flight and will continue play the following week.

The record is declared phenomenal by golf players who know the contour of the green and the approach to it. W. J. White was playing with Mr. Bennett when he did his wonderful golf work.

Fire Blight Warning

Slight infections of fire blight have been found in three orchards above Parkdale this week. While it is not possible that the infection is a virulent form and that it will become serious every precaution should be taken and the infected twigs cut off and burned. The blight is found in on vigorous one-year old shoots, and an occasional fruit spur.

All cuts and tools should be disinfected with the following: Cyanide of mercury, four tablets; chloroxide of mercury, four tablets; glycerine, one pint; water, one pint. Bichloride of mercury comes in two sizes—use the large tablets.

All suspicious cases should be reported to the fruit inspector's office that the orchard may be carefully watched. Our disease troubles from other sources are too great to allow more to be added in the form of fire blight.

Union Oil Company Here

The Union Oil Co. has purchased a site just above the O. W. R. & N. tracks at the west edge of the city, where plans call for the early construction of a distributing branch. The oil company has applied to the city for a permit to construct a plant. The company will also need the extension of a street through the new industrial section at the west edge of town.

ODELL COLD STORAGE PLANT TO BE BEST

The Apple Growers Association is pushing to completion at Odell a 100,000-box capacity cold storage plant, which by its construction will have studied the plans of construction and the system of refrigeration to be the best plant west of the Mississippi river. The Andrew Construction Co., of Portland, is engaged in placing the concrete walls, floors and ceilings of the big plant. They will also place the brick insulation. The cost of this work will reach \$21,500.

The contract for installing two 30-ton compressors, brine tanks and piping was let to the York Products Co. at a cost of \$27,573. The B. F. Sturtevant Co. was given the contract for installing fans and airwashers at the cost of \$2,700.

MOUNTAIN STUNTS PLANNED FOR SUNDAY

Plans of Kent Rheenaker, Mark Wergandt and a party of legionnaires call for some interesting stunts on the glaciers and snowfields of Mt. Hood. One of the best known mid-Columbia packers will equip the party with a pack train.
