SCOTCH PAPEY PAYS TRIBUTE TO APPLE

The following account of the apple was clipped from the Botanist, published at Edinburgh:

There is considerable opinion upon the beneficial property of some of the varieties appear to agree—namely, the apple. Though such a common fruit, many are not fully aware of the apple's valuable medicinal properties. It is claimed on the basis that the apple is an excellent food, owing to the amount of phosphoric acid it contains in an easily digestible form; that it excites the action of the liver, promotes sound and healthy sleep, and thoroughly cleanses the mouth, and the like. It is also claimed that the formation of some obnoxious indigestion, and is one of the best preventives of diseases of the throat; and last, but not least, it is said, next to the lemon or orange, to be the best antidote for the thirst and craving of those addicted to the alcohol and opium habit. This reads like the legend of the wonderful apple of Samarkand in "The Arabian Nights," the mere mention of which was a remedy for every human ailment. Its botanical name, *malus*, (despite the long "a") is a libel, seeing it is all good. We have a couplet that "an apple a day keeps the doctor away," especially when eaten before going to bed; and the Americans, who have always been great "boosters" of the fruit, have another "jingle":

Are you feeling kinder sick,
Like a rag the chickens pick?
Are you feeling cross and worried?
Wish, almost, you're dead and buried?
Eat an apple!

which, while not ranking high as poetry, reveals the proper spirit towards the apple. In 1916 the Americans started an "Apple Week," which bids fair to become a national institution, and very amusing are some of the notices that herald its advent—for example, "Eve, viii. 3, Adam viii. 1-2" and "now that the apple is in its active operation they will doubtless be enlarged upon year by year, though, to judge from the recent increase in tea-drinking in the United States, the inhabitants are trying to drive their dryness in the cup that cheers, but not inebriates." Following this lead a "Fruit Week" has been inaugurated in various centers of Great Britain, when a great amount of advertisement is focused on the health value of fruit, and children are invited to compete for barrels of apples or boxes of oranges. Scotland has taken up the idea with enthusiasm.

Treatment of Canker Branches

Many apple trees throughout the valley are showing numerous dead branches which for the most part have been killed through activities of winter injury and perennial canker. The fact that we possess little information concerning the methods of infection of this disease, this station cannot definitely recommend a proved method of treatment. Our observations seem to indicate that infections doubtless take place during the dormant period. This point can only be determined by experimental work, but, however, that the cutting of diseased branches can be most safely done during hot weather, as it is a known fact that spores cannot grow in the absence of moisture. Because of this fact, the station recommends the diseased limbs to be cut out at this time. It is not known whether the disease is transferable on pruning tools or not. The closely related diseases do not cause infections in this way. This will doubtless prove to be the case with this disease. Where large limbs are cut, it would be advisable to disinfect the wound with cyanide of mercury and bichloride of mercury used at the rate of one part of 1000 each of these chemicals with water. This material should be kept in a glass container and applied with a brush. The station is investigating various types of wood preservatives and wound dressings but is not in a position to make definite recommendations along this line. It will be well for growers, however, to try out in a limited way brands offered for sale for this purpose.

Young Weber heard the stealthy approach of the redman, who, evidently thinking the boys asleep, crawled to their father's camp, in a draw beside the road. After listening and watching for a time, he aroused young Keir, who was exhausted from the long ride through the north central Oregon country. The latter, startled, grabbed a .22 rifle and but for the quick work of his companion, might have fired at the Indian. The latter was evidently frightened, for he disappeared, and the boys were left unharmed the remainder of the night.
