U. P. LINE INSTALLS AUTOMATIC DEVICE The O. W. R. & N. Co. has just completed the installation of an automatic block system between Portland and The Dalles that will set the brakes and stop any train that may run into a block already occupied by another train. Electricity plays a prominent part in the operation of the automatic safety device, and because of the need of an uninterrupted electric service the Pacific Power & Light Co. is completing a private line to the rail track direct from its Powerdale plant on Hood river. The electric energy will be taken direct from bus bars and transmitted at 6000 volts to the rail line's distributing system along the rail tracks. There the power is stepped down to 2200 volts. At intervals along the track it is again stepped down to 110 and 50 volts for use in the automatic safety device. The Pacific Power & Light Co. will supply electric energy for operation of the new safety device from The Dalles to Warrendale. The experimental system was applied to the O. W. R. & N. tracks between Portland and The Dalles at the instance of the Interstate Commerce commission. The Union Pacific line was selected to make the test on the Pacific coast. Eastern roads are making similar tests. In case the electric energy is cut off at the local power house, every train between Warrendale and The Dalles will be brought to a stop.
