PAROLE BOARD MAY RELEASE CRAWFORD

At the request of the state parole board District Attorney Baker submitted a report on the case of John H. Crawford who pleaded guilty last February to operating a still in Hood River county and was sentenced by Judge Wilson to one year in the state penitentiary. Crawford had no money with which to secure counsel to properly defend himself and evidence showed that he had been hired to operate the still by Randolph H. Gibson. Gibson was taken into custody at the same time that Crawford was arrested. At a preliminary examination Gibson pleaded not guilty. Later he was tried before a jury and acquitted of the charge of being engaged in the manufacture of moonshine. It was alleged at the trial that Gibson owned both the still and the land on which it was being operated. Evidently believing that Crawford was more innocent than allowing the parole board to seeking to secure a recommendation from District Attorney Baker and the district court that Crawford be released after he has served the minimum sentence. What making no recommendation, District Attorney Baker made a report to the parole board citing the facts in the case. If the parole board release Crawford at the end of the minimum sentence he will have served about ten months.

RULING OF JUDGE WILSON AFFIRMED

A decision of Judge Wilson in the case of the state of Oregon by the fish commission versus Sidney E. Holder, et al, was affirmed last week by the Oregon supreme court. The case involved the right of the state to condemn lands on Herman creek. It occasioned a legal battle of considerable proportions in the circuit court here. Both sides appealed to the supreme court.

Whisk Home Burned

The new home of George Whirrick, a rancher at Dee, was totally destroyed by fire Friday which is thought to have been started from a spark falling on the roof. Part of the furnishings were saved. The loss is placed at \$2500, covered by insurance.
