C. A. WILLIAMS IS CALLED BY DEATH

C. A. Williams, past commander of the Department of Oregon, Grand Army of the Republic, died at his home in Gladstone, July 24. Mr. Williams was the able and efficient adjutant general and quartermaster general of the Department for 17 years. At the state convocation held at Newberg in 1907 S. F. Blythe was elected Department Commander. He gave Mr. Williams his first appointment as adjutant and for 17 years he filled the office, giving his whole time to it at Puddington encampment in 1922 he was elected Department Commander. During his term of office he visited every Grand Army post in the state of Oregon.

Mr. Williams was born in Theford, Vt., August 28, 1844. As a lad of 19 he enlisted in Company I, 9th Vermont volunteers, and entered Richmond with the victorious Union army. After the war was over he lived in his native state, then pioneered in western Kansas. He returned east, living in Franklin, N. H., until 1887, when he came to the Pacific coast, embarking in the sawmill business near Seattle. He came to Oregon City three years later and was one of the earliest settlers of Gladstone, where he lived for 35 years, being an ex-member of the Gladstone city council.

He was a member of the first Methodist church of Oregon City for many years and a member of the official board. He belonged to Sumner Post, G. A. R., for years, but recently transferred to Mendocino Post, Oregon City, of which he was formerly a member. He was a member of the Gladstone lodge of Odd Fellows.

He is survived by two sons, W. A. Williams, of Ketchikan, Alaska, and Clark H. Williams, a member of the Oregonian staff.

The funeral was held Saturday from the Methodist church at Oregon City. Mr. Blythe was in Oregon City Saturday to attend the funeral services.
