

APPLE HARVEST HAS STARTED

GRAVENSTEINS TO ROLL THIS WEEK

Growers Picking Bartlett Pears, Which Are Selling for Record Price of \$80 Per Ton

The 1925 apple and pear harvest was launched here this week, growers of the Lower Valley sections begin-ning to pick their Gravensteins, early of the Lower Valley sections beginning to pick their Gravensteins, early variety of apples, and Bartlett pears. The Apple Growers Association, which began receiving apples at warehouses here, expects to ship two cars of Gravensteins this week. The valley's tonnage of this variety, which will reach only about 16 cars, will bring a record price this season, because of the shortage of Gravensteins in the Sebastopol, Calif., section.

Hood River's Bartlett pear tonnage is estimated at 450 to 500 tons, and canners are paying \$80 per ton for the variety, a record price for canning pears. The district will have 200 cars of d'Anjou and 50 cars of miscellameous winter pears, which are expected to bring top prices.

While the apple tonnage of Hood River valley will of exceed 1,800,000 boxes, an approximate 60 per cent of last year, growers and shippers are starting the harvest with optimism. While other northwestern sections will have a much heavier yield than a year ago, the local district's crop

While other northwestern sections will have a much heavier yield than will have a much heavier yield than a year ago, the local district's crop will be characterized by better size and quality than a year ago, and the total returns for 1925 are expected to be 75 per cent of last year's returns on the 60 per cent tonnage.

While no rain has fallen here since June 10, the dry spell reaching a record of 62 days, heavy rains prevailed through May and early June. Deep snows were piled up in the highland forests and irrigation water broken in force."

The four northwestern states, Washington, Gregon, Idaho and Montana, will produce the second largest apple crop in the history of the boxed apple industry, second only to the bumper yield of 1923 when a total in excess of 50,000 cars was shipped out. Washington's crop was the second largest ever produced in that state, over 27,350,000 boxes and probably close to 34,000 cars, against approximately 38,000 shipped in 1923, the largest year, and between 24,000 and 25,000 cars shipped during the past senson.

Oregon's estimated production this year is slightly under 5,000 cars. This will be under the 1923 crop by fully 2,000 cars and about 500 cars less than were shipped during the past

The shortage of the Oregon crop will be more than made up by that of the state of Idaho, estimates placing their 1925 crop at between 5,000 and 6,000 cars, second only to their 1923 crop of 6,622 cars. The 1924 crop was very light, around 1,000 cars.

The Montana crop will approach a total failure this year, winter injury having taken such a severe toll that probable shipments this coming season are estimated at less than 100 cars.
