THE LAW REQUIRES LEGAL AUTO LIGHTS
September 1, 1925, chapter 323 of the laws of 1925, regulating the adjustment of motor vehicle lights in Oregon will go into effect, and, inasmuch as the law assumes that all motor vehicles within the state will have been provided with approved lighting equipment, properly adjusted according to legal standard, enforcement of the provisions of the law will begin upon that date by the traffic division of the department of secretary of state.
No lighting station can legally adjust lights until it has on display, in a conspicuous place, a certificate of authorization issued by the secretary of state and no mechanic can legally adjust lights until he has been examined and licensed so to do, and his certificate of authorization must also be made available upon demand. To date 44 light adjusting stations have been approved throughout the state and licenses have been issued to 110 qualified adjusters.
Applications for appointment as authorized light adjusting stations are being received daily, and, as rapidly as they are equipped with facilities for testing and adjusting, they are inspected by an officer of the state traffic department, and if approved, a certificate of authority is issued. Applications are also being received for appointment as authorized light adjusters and licenses are being issued as rapidly as compliance with legal requirements is established.
The old magneto type of head-lights will not meet the requirements of the law, and all cars operating under this type of illumination must be re-equipped with electric or acetylene systems before they can operate on the public highways on and after September 1. The change can be made at nominal cost.
Adjustment receipts cannot be issued by the adjuster for any device which has not been tested by the United States bureau of standards and approved by the secretary of state. To date 17 different head lamp, reflector and control devices have passed the test and been approved by the secretary of state and this list is furnished each authorized light adjusting station and must be posted conspicuously upon a bulletin board provided for that purpose. As tests are completed additions will be made to the authorized lists.
A maximum charge of 75 cents is allowed by law for light adjusting service, exclusive of equipment to conform to legal requirements.

AUTHOR-ORCHARDIST VISITS THE VALLEY
H. H. Rutzebeck, publisher of the Paradise Progress Review and owner of prune and apple orchards at Paradise Ridge, California, near Chico, was here last week interviewing growers and officials of the Apple Growers Association and endeavoring to secure information that will aid in administering the affairs of a new cooperative just established in the California deciduous district.
"We expect a tonnage of 100,000 boxes of fruit, Delicious, Baldwin and McIntosh Reds," said Mr. Rutzebeck, "and it is our aim to develop a home market for every box. We have a sufficient population to take the apples within a hauling radius. Our new cooperative is known as the Paradise Progressive Association. About 90 per cent of the growers are members. We have 11,000 acres well watered and grow a fine quality of prunes and pears."
Mr. Rutzebeck is an author of international note, having written "Alaska Man's Luck," which is now in its fifth edition. The book was received with acclaim in England and Scandinavian countries. He has written other volumes about his 10 years in Alaska.
While here Mr. Rutzebeck called on the Book & Art store and arranged to have his book sold here. He visited the Mosler district.

Former Local Girl is Queen

Miss Alice Ramsey, daughter of Mrs. Louise Lester, well known civic worker, was crowned queen of the North Long Beach merchants' festa. More than 1500 persons were present to witness the close of the strenuous contest for royal honors which was under way during the past week and to witness the coronation.
Frank F. Merriem, speaker of the assembly, acted as officiating, delivering an address in which he gave high praise to North Long Beach for its civic spirit and community enthusiasm.
Mr. Merriem presented Miss Ramsey with a diamond ring, the prize offered by the festa management to the successful contestant. Four other contestants, Misses Dorothy Pearl, Katherine Brewer, Beatrice Garret and Blanche Overmayer, officiated as maids of honor at the coronation and were presented with silver compacts.
Queen Alice will hold court again tonight, the closing day of the festa and, with her attendants, will receive personal friends, North Long Beach civic bodies and visitors. As further reward for being the successful contestant for queenly honors, Miss Ramsey will be given a part in "The Last Warning," the dramatic production which will be given during the current week at the Oriental theater.
The festa, which has been a success even greater than anticipated, according to North Long Beach business men, winds up tonight with a carnival celebration which will include confetti and the spirit of fun which characterizes such occasions.

Road Repair Sought
Residents of the West Side have launched complaints over the condition of the road that leads from the city from Thirteenth street across Paradise farm. Because of the easy grade, this road is used for bringing in a heavy tonnage of summer fruits and vegetables. In the fall thousands of boxes of apples are brought to town by this route.
The growers say the road has been allowed to fall into disrepair and that at present it cannot be negotiated with comfort in an automobile. It is declared so rough that soft fruit is often injured by bruising.
Power Wire Puts Phones Out
When a high voltage power line of the Pacific Power & Light Co. recently fell across the wires of the Oregon-Washington Telephone Co., which serve the Heights and West Side sections about 100 telephones were put out of commission. Damage of \$300 resulted. Linemen were on the ground within a few minutes and service was rapidly restored.

AN INCIDENT OF LAST WEEK'S CIRCUS
Suppose you were in the middle of Africa, the only white man there, being exhibited at a circus to a crowd of natives and one of them mentioned Hood River, Or. Would it pique your interest?
It must have been something like that the other day at The Dalles when a circus that attracted hundreds of local folk had spread its big top and all the sidewalks were offering their curious wares. Mrs. Floyd L. French, who has an uncle, David Byrlee, a missionary at Bojenge, Congo Beige, and her husband had motored up from here with their children. Waiting for the big show to open, they had entered the side show and were looking around. The children became interested in a case of snakes in front of a black boy, dressed in native costume, who sat and stared in bored fashion from his platform. Someone asked the boy where he was born. With expression still bored he responded: "The Belgian Congo."
Mrs. French overheard the question and answer and asked the black boy if he had ever been at Bojenge. His face changed instantly. He had been born within a few miles of the missionary town. Although he left the Congo country 12 years ago, having gone out with a party of circus animal gardeners, he declared his aim to return next year. The boy said his name is Karu. He had ridden on "The Oregon," steamboat that was bought by the Christian church with money raised by people of this state. The boy, however, did not know that the circus was in the state of Oregon. He expressed himself as homesick; that he wanted to get back where the climate was better; where they had the rainy and the dry season and no intermittent thunderstorms in between.
The Congo boy showed real regret when the call came that the show was ready to begin under the big top and those Americans who knew something of his old home town had to leave him.
