BARTON BUILDING

STONE TILE HOUSE

Stone tile, the new hollow wall building unit, that has recently come into this community from California, is making a place for itself rapidly. The building will be 48x96 feet and two-story, the basement or lower story being used for storage.

he went to California and there studied the latest methods of apple and warehouse construction. There he found the wet mix, hollow unit stone tile in general use in the best structures and was told that in a country like Oregon, where frost and rain were the rule rather than the exceptions, it would serve even better than in the dry climate of California.

Mr. Barton has returned to his east-home, leaving the completion of the structure to his orchard manager, St. Claire Diamond, and E. E. Newell, engineer.

BRIDGE OF THE GODS IS AGAIN TO FORE
