She has had a great deal more tournament experience this year and from her showing Monday in the qualifying round has a very good chance for the title. Local club members should be proud of Hood River's showing in outside competition so far this season.

The club has just received several hundred rule books on the ancient game and any member may have one by asking ye scribe of kinks for one. I want to say at this time that every one will profit by reading and learning this little book. It is surprising the few golfers who know the fundamental rules of the game. Not only on the local course, but everywhere in the country, there are vital infractions on the rules during every round of golf. Most of these mistakes are made through lack of knowledge. Play the game as it should be played and it will be much more interesting. One of the greatest assets to golf is the honorable observance of rules and etiquette. Get a rule book and study it.

Let's all resolve: To keep quiet on the tee, and any other time when anyone is making a shot.

To hole out every putt—and have our opponent do the same.

To always signal the party behind to come through as soon as you or your party lose a ball. Then if you find the ball while they are playing through give them time to get out of range before playing the next shot.

To move off the green as soon as the putts are holed, and figure the score on the next tee.

To be courteous to your caddy—help him be a better one.

To always smile and resolve to do better next time when you dub a shot. Getting mad only makes more dub shots.

To be ready with praise for a well played shot by an opponent. To do everything in our power to make the royal and ancient game of golf the wonderful game that it is.

Money May Be Wired to Mexico Effective August 15, 1925, the Western Union Telegraph Co. has arranged a new money transfer service to and from Mexico. Heretofore it has been possible to telegraph money to Mexico only at a considerably higher rate. Under the new arrangement money can be sent to or from Mexico in amounts varying from \$5 to \$500 at a cost of the tolls for the actual number of words in the transfer message at regular through commercial telegraph rates plus a transfer charge of 2% of the principal, with a minimum charge of 50c per transfer.

The new arrangement will be in effect for transfers to and from Canada, the same as the United States. This entirely new service is made possible by arrangement between the Mexican government and the Western Union Telegraph Co. and marks another progressive and important step in the process of worldwide extension of Western Union service.
