REGIONAL BOARD TO BE ORGANIZED

Attendance of representatives of all local business and agricultural interests at the meeting at the Multnomah hotel in Portland today when the Pacific Northwest Regional Advisory Board will be organized, was advised Tuesday by A. F. Steele, president of the Chamber of Commerce, who was chairman of a luncheon meeting of the chamber at the Columbia Gorge hotel.

Mr. Steele, who is chairman of the organization meeting of the advisory board, which will function as a sub-committee of the Highway Commission, has recently attended meetings of the Pacific coast board at California points. He said that the board will function in securing and providing a supply of cars for shippers of all commodities. It will also act to prevent the hiding of cars with products aboard at eastern terminals.

Mr. Steele said that the cost of the board, the maintenance of each of which, averaged \$20,000 of Oregon taxes, is borne by the railway association, but that the reforms they had brought about were worth far more. Not a car shortage of consequence has prevailed, he said, since the system was inaugurated six years ago.

At the meeting in Portland today, Ralph Budd, president of the Great Northern railroad, will deliver an address. While the activities of the board are controlled by committees, representatives of all lines of business, agricultural, mining, financial and industrial, Mr. Steele cited that a railway contact board has been appointed to hear complaints, in case satisfaction cannot be secured from all lines.

President Turner of the Seattle, Portland and Spokane Railway Co. is chairman of the contact board.

The Pacific Northwest regional board will comprise all of Washington, Idaho to Salmon river and all of Oregon except a few shipping points in the furthest southern part of the state.

H. J. Arnett, he said, had already been appointed manager of the board, and had taken up his headquarters in Portland August 15.

Mr. Steele said that meetings will be rotated at Portland, Seattle and Spokane.

He said that the activities of the boards were aiding farmers and shippers in the prevention of cross hauls, representing all lines of business.

The value of the boards was clearly shown, he said, by the way the Pacific coast shippers take an interest in their organization. He said that 401 representatives of various industry attended the meeting at the Columbia Gorge hotel.

STATION PURCHASE WILL BE DISCUSSED

Saturday afternoon a joint meeting of the fruit growers' committee and the experiment station committee of the Pomona grange was held. Though provision was made at the time of the last budget meeting of the county court for the purchase of a permanent station site and the state legislature passed the necessary appropriation, the matter of purchase has not as yet assumed definite shape. The station work is being carried on as previously, cooperating with growers of the valley.

Several properties have been offered for experimental work but before taking definite action the committee and the county court as well felt that the matter should be placed before the property owners of the valley that all might be made familiar with the progress being made.

It is the county court's and committee's desire that all owners having suitable property for sale, submit a description and valuation of same in writing, on or before noon, September 2, 1925, that the matter may be considered at the time of the next meeting of the county court.

The station officials have pointed out the fact that "just land" or "just property" all accredited Pomona life saving examiner, who spent the day in giving tests at Kobberg beach. The examination ended a summer swimming school conducted by J. H. Kobberg in conjunction with the recreational division of the city schools.
