Mrs. J. R. Hulse is visiting relatives and friends in Salem.

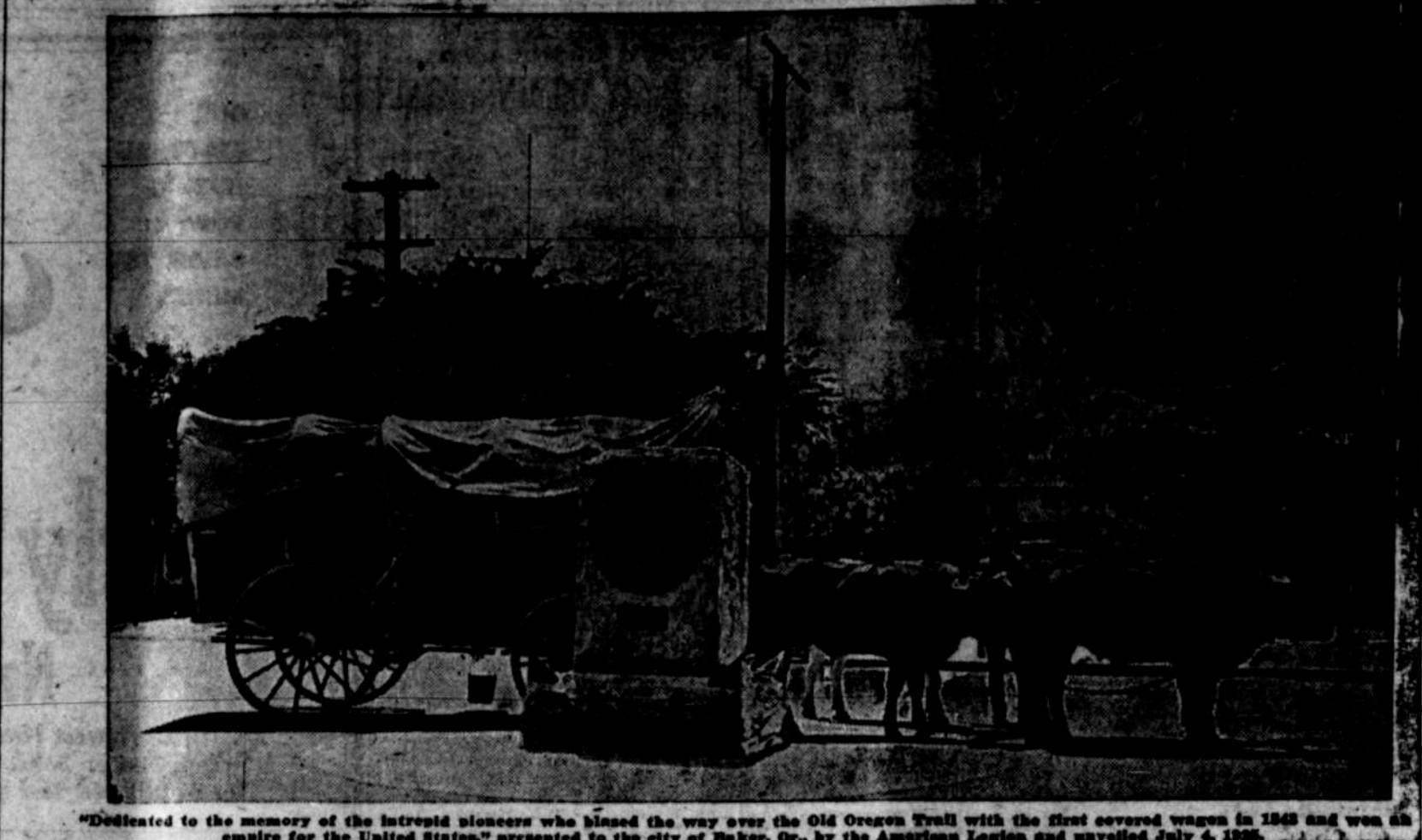

## OLD OREGON TRAIL MONUMENT



The Old Oregon Trail monument was erected by the American Legion, and presented to the city of Baker, with imposing ceremonies July 4, 1925. The presentation was made by W. E. Meacham, president, Old Oregon Trail

association, and was accepted by Mayor C. L. Palmer on behalf of the city of Baker. The monument is over ten tons in weight, and is of native granite. Imbedded in it is the bronze design of the ox-team and covered wagon, as occupies a prominent place in the past conceived by Avar Fairbanks, dean of the sculpture, University of Oregon. It is the intention and desire of the The Oregon Trail association to have diameter and weighs 200 pounds.
