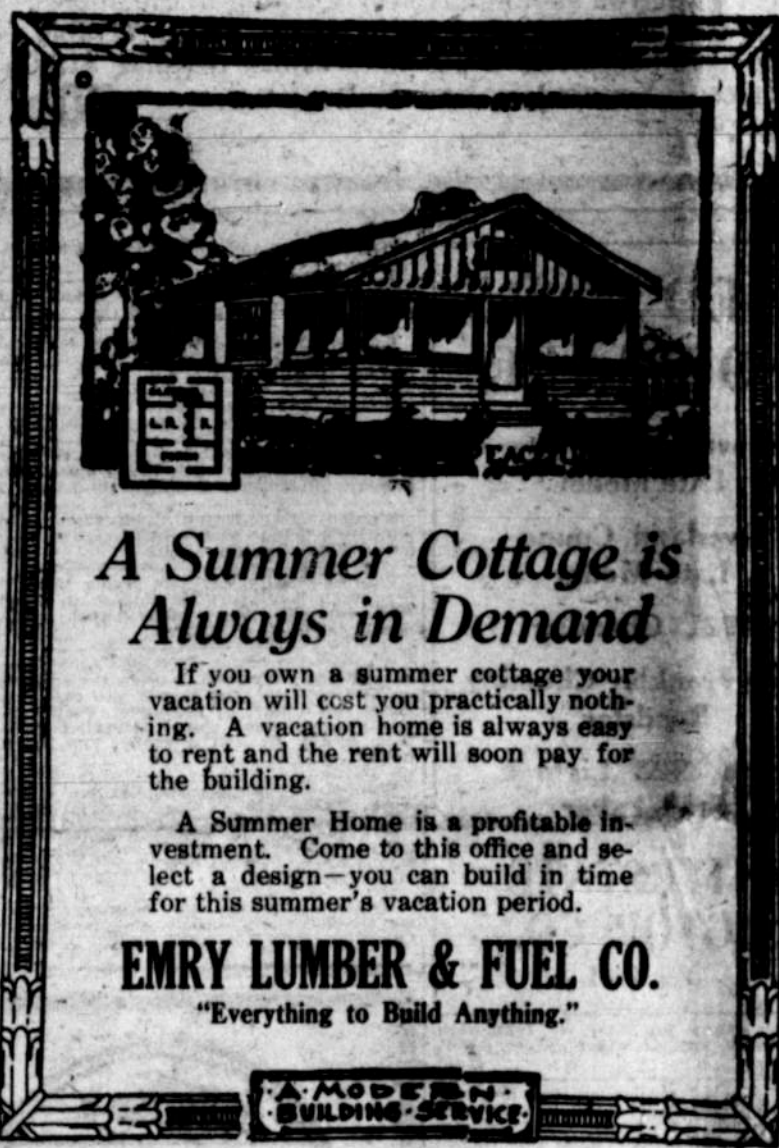

SCHOOL FAIR NEXT SATURDAY

MANY CHILDREN TO MAKE DISPLAYS

Community Exhibits are Being Planned by
Numerous Schools—Premium
List a Large One

The annual Hood River county school fair will be held at the Hood River high school Saturday with County School Superintendent Critch in charge. Students from all schools of the county will enter individual exhibits and many community exhibits will be made.

Several hundred dollars in premiums will be awarded to the children.

1. All exhibits must be left to the close of the fair Saturday evening.
2. Each school should take the responsibility of placing, tagging and caring for the exhibits during the entire time of the fair. Someone should have charge of the booth at all times.
3. The two boys and the two girls scoring highest in club projects will be given free trips to the state fair at Salem.
4. Put quality into your exhibits. Have an eye to beauty and harmony.

Pythian Band Men
GET AN OVATION

The members of the Hood River Pythian band, who spent last week at New Westminster, B. C., playing for the Provincial fair, received an ovation while in the north. The band men, who won the invitation to make the northern trip by their appearance last year, in unique Indian costumes, at a convention of the Dramatic Order of the Knights of Khorassan at Vancouver, were met at Blaine, the international boundary, by a delegation of British Columbia Pythians. They found on arrival that reservations had been made for them and a dinner was served and ready for the entire party.

Thursday evening the band men were allowed to leave the fair pavilion early in order to attend a reception given for them at the Vancouver Pythian Temple by Pythians of Vancouver and New Westminster.

"It was indeed a wonderful trip," said Bert Stranahan. "They treated us royally. The folk of that country are extremely hospitable. It was a great show. I have never seen finer exhibits of agricultural products and manufactured articles. The floral show was marvelous. Saturday evening a jumping horse set a world's record by clearing an obstacle that was 8 feet 1 1/2 inches high."

The butter exhibit made by the Hood River Dairy Co., which is organized somewhat like our Apple Growers Association, was interesting.

Odd Fellows Con-
vention is Near

The local Odd Fellows lodge is making preparations to greet thousands of delegates to the Sovereign Grand Lodge, which will meet in Portland next week when they pass through here en route around the Mount Hood Loop highway. A local committee, composed of J. H. Sorell, Dr. L. H. Alexander and Floyd Arnold, met in Portland with committees from various other lodges Monday night. The Loop highway trip, it was stated, will be one of the chief entertainment features of the convention.

The Odd Fellows of Oregon are to entertain many train loads of eastern visitors at Sovereign Grand Lodge, which meets in Portland September 21-25. Although the gathering will be held in Portland, and the 7,000 members of the order in that city are directly handling the big convention, yet the task falls upon the whole state and every member of the order is contributing toward the entertainment fund, which will aggregate nearly \$50,000. The city of Portland is contributing \$20,000 out of their combined convention fund which was subscribed early in the year to handle some 16 major conventions which were to meet in Portland during the season.

The Odd Fellows are one of the largest, if not the largest, fraternal organization in the world, and this is a world gathering. The Grand Size of Australia will be present to represent that section. There will be general thousand from the provinces of Canada, where there are many flourishing Odd Fellow lodges. A number of states of the east are sending special train loads.

This occasion will be the celebrating of the 100th anniversary of the order. The program has just been completed and is now in the hands of the printer. It will be a souvenir booklet of the Pacific Northwest, containing pictures of all the leaders of the various branches in the order.

Sunday, September 20, special services will be held for the visitors in the First Baptist church. They will be followed by a reception in the afternoon at the Odd Fellows Home, 32nd and Holgate streets, given by the Rebekah Assembly of Oregon to all Odd Fellows and Rebekahs.

The regular sessions of the various branches of the order will be held in the new Odd Fellows temple, corner 10th and Salmon streets, opening the morning of September 21. The evening sessions, general receptions, etc., will be held in the City Auditorium, while there will be several banquets held in the dining rooms of Hotel Multnomah, which is the official headquarters for Sovereign Grand Lodge officers.

About 50 bands and drum corps have been signed up. The parade will form on 14th and Morrison streets and the streets running south and west from this intersection, to 9th, starting at 2 o'clock, and the line of march will be as follows: From 14th and Morrison streets, east on Morrison to 12th, north on 12th to Alder, east on Alder to Broadway, north on Broadway to Pine, east on Pine to 9th, south on 9th to Morrison, east on Morrison to 5th, north on 5th to Pine, east on Pine to 4th, south on 4th to Taylor, west on Taylor to 10th, south on 10th to Madison, east on Madison to 9th, disbanding to the east and south as directed by the marshals.

Taking it all in all, it is expected that the Odd Fellows parade will be one of the most spectacular and dignified pageants that has taken place in Portland during the year.

A Rebekah degree team is coming from Transcon, Manitoba, which is near Winnipeg. There will also be degree teams from Vancouver, B. C., Seattle, Bellingham, and a number of northern cities. Detroit, Mich., is sending a Rebekah team with the hope of capturing the first prize in putting on the Rebekah degree.

Local people are thoroughly interested in helping to entertain the host of visitors that are coming as guests to the order, and are planning on attending the Portland meeting at least 250 strong.

BUTTER MAKERS VOICE RAISE

DECLARE OREGON, SEPT. 17

Oregon hospitality scored again Tuesday when Hood River civic organizations and the directors of the Hood River creamery joined hands to entertain an approximate 250 delegates to the national butter makers' convention, in session in Portland this week.

The visitors sounded their praises of scenery and the courteous treatment accorded them by the Hood River Chamber of Commerce and The Guides, whose members in unique Swiss Alpine costume met the motor cortege bearing the visitors at Mt. Hood on the Loop highway and escorted them to points of scenic interest and the orchard districts before taking them to Koberg beach for a salmon barbecue luncheon.

As the automobiles with the visitors reached the Mt. Hood postoffice each was stopped, in order that a Guide might get aboard and explain the country penetrated. These Guides apparently didn't have to do all the talking. Every Guide Tuesday afternoon and evening was telling of the exclamations of delight exhibited by the buttermaker delegates as the cars passed orchards, where the red fruit bent the boughs of apple trees. As the cars started down Booth hill, the visitors again grew superlative in their praise of Oregon scenery.

The barbecued salmon, prepared in royal manner by W. L. Richmond, of Stevenson, Wash., who was secured for the occasion by W. M. Black Saturday, and all that went with such a feast formed a luncheon banquet, which the visitors said they will never forget. John Koberg was not left out by any means, when the compliments were being passed around. Koberg had outdone himself to make the visit to his beach attractive.

The delegates had all apparently heard of Rev. Billy Sunday's Hood River ranch, and when they arrived the Odell community they stretched their necks to view his buildings and possibly catch a glimpse of his famous bull.

E. C. Eldredge, Portland and Corvallis, Ore., presided at the meeting. Al W. Peters, of the local creamery, delivered the welcoming address. Other speakers were J. D. Nichols, of the Oregon Food and Drug Commission, and Vice President Bibby of the national association, whose home is in Oklahoma.

The delegates said they had never heard of the Hood River ranch, but they were told it was the best of its kind in the West. The excellent butter was the product of the Eugene creamery.

Truman Butler was chairman of the Chamber of Commerce committee in charge of the event.

Defense Wins In
Timber Lawsuit

A jury Monday night in the case of the Wind River Lumber Co. versus the Wind River Timber Co., where the plaintiff was seeking to recover itself of a sawmill that had been leased to the defendant at Cascade Locks, returned a verdict for the latter.

The plaintiff company alleged that it had not been paid for the plant for a number of months, although the contract of lease provided for termination of the lease and re-entry of the owners within 15 days after the defendant had defaulted on rental payments. The defense, however, set up that rental had been paid, but that vouchers, at the instructions of the plaintiff, had been drawn to cover a lump sum for convenience in handling the money.

The case, because of the magnitude of property involved, created considerable interest. Judge Derby handled the defense, and Isham Smith and Geo. D. Black, of the firm of Portland attorneys, Platt, Platt, Fales & Smith, appeared for the plaintiff. It was anticipated that considerable time would be needed for hearing the case, but after rulings of Judge Wilson the issue was narrowed down to payment or non-payment of rental for the milling property, and the jury returned its verdict about 8:30 Monday night.

A second suit has been filed against the Wind River Timber Co. by the Ladd & Tilton Bank, which seeks the foreclosure of two mortgages, one for \$100,000 and another for \$29,000. These mortgages were assigned to the bank, according to the complaint, by the plaintiff of the first suit. Cook-Ingham and Hanley, Portland attorneys in the case for the bank, ask for attorneys' fees aggregating \$12,000. They have asked that the timber company be restrained from further sale of lumber.

Taft is Planning
Large Building

L. E. Taft has purchased from The Dalles garage and B. B. Shelley a plot 100 by 100 feet at the corner of First and State streets. Mr. Taft is having plans drawn for the construction of a 50 by 100 concrete building. The new place of business will be ready for occupancy, it was stated, by next spring.

Mr. Taft is a pioneer here in the fuel and feed business, having occupied for more than 15 years the building owned by the Masonic lodge and fronting on Third street. He owns a large modern storage warehouse between the bridge road and the O.W. R. & N. tracks. At the storage warehouse he has constructed storage bins for the economical handling of coal.
