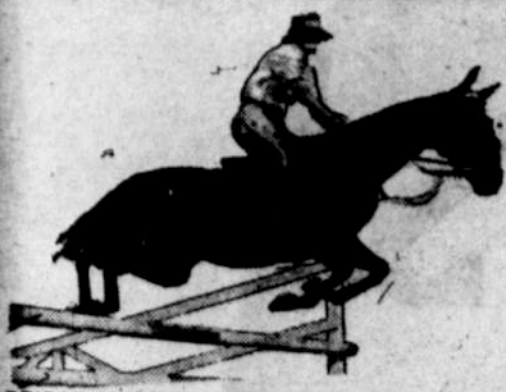

The Pacific International Horse Show, Portland, Oct. 31st to Nov. 7th, again takes the front of the stage in 1925 with the largest offering of premium money in America.

The stake events are: Olympic Hotel, Seattle, \$2,000, for five-gaited horses; Seattle Horse Show Association, \$2,000, to be shown in two divisions as follows: \$1,000, five-gaited mares and \$1,000, five-gaited stallions and geldings; Northwestern National Bank, \$2,000, for roadsters; Portland Chamber of Commerce, \$2,000, for heavy harness ponies; Sovereign Hotel, \$2,000, hunters and jumpers; Portland Hotel, \$2,000, heavy harness horses; Multnomah Hotel, \$2,000, three-gaited horses; W. F. Turner, \$1,000, junior five-gaited horses; Henry Thiele, \$1,000, Shetland ponies; Olds, Wortman & King, \$1,000, polo mounts; Benson

Hotel, \$1,000, fine harness horses; and Imperial Hotel, \$1,000, six-in-hand driving.

The greatest series of horse shows ever known is being held now in California at Stockton, Sacramento, Ventura and Pomona, all former shows being augmented by a flood of newly purchased show horses. According to General Manager O. M. Plummer of the Exposition and Horse Show Manager, A. P. Fleming, a train load of livestock, of which 14 carloads are horses, will come from the east to Portland this fall, as will all the horses now showing in California.

The result of these additions will unquestionably enable the Pacific International to break the size and quality records now being made in the south.

The growth of the horse show feature of the Pacific International is one of the most significant facts of the comeback of the horse.

CARE SHOULD BE USED IN LOADING

The Hood River county fruit inspector's office is in receipt of information from the New York market inspector's office which is of interest to the local shippers. While the communication deals primarily with prunes, its general information is also of value to apple shippers. W. C. Hockleman, regional supervisor, sends the following communication:

"We have examined a number of cars of Northwestern Italian prunes in this market recently that are exported to European ports.

"In most cases the applicant is primarily interested in the condition of the fruit and this is general has been satisfactory. We have noted serious damage to the containers in practically all of them. To some extent this has also been true in some cars of export stock, would result in less damage and be a paying proposition to the shippers.

"In most instances, only every third layer is stripped and these strips are single building lath in some cases and have only one nail to each piece. Double lath are usually placed over the top of the load, but a small nail is frequently used in this and when the car arrives much of the top stripping is frequently broken loose. The contrast between the average car and some cars of prunes from California that have been stripped with 1/2-inch strips cut the full width of the car and securely nailed, has been very noticeable. A method of bracing in which the 2-inch by 4-inch are placed against the ends of boxes or cases and the boards are placed on the outside of the 2-inch by 4-inch, has been used in many of these prune shipments. In several instances the cases have shifted more or less and worked away from the 2x4s, allowing them to shift up against the boards and this play has resulted in considerable racking and breakage."

In general, as far as known, the shipments from Hood River arrive on the eastern market without undue loss from breakage. Last year very few cars came to the attention of this office where centerbracing had given away. However, we do feel that a little more care should be used in stripping. Mr. Hockleman's suggestion in regard to 1/2-inch strips cut the whole width of the car should be considered.
