WHITE SALMON

Cooperative weather report for 24-hour period ending at 5 p. m., Saturday. Maximum temperature 60; minimum 38. Partly cloudy; west wind.

R. J. Parriott and W. L. Upson, of the White Salmon Machine Shop, recently completed a fine new auto bus for use of pupils in Hood River, capacity 60 persons. This firm has been turning out splendid work since the establishment of their plant here. Both of these men were formerly located in Hood River. They have been fortunate in securing the services of J. W. Carnot, a machinist of wide experience, who came here from Seattle to engage in machining. The latter is vacationing in Portland for a few days.

Some of the growers in the Burdoin mountain, Burdoin Heights, Mountain Brook and Snowden districts have commenced packing apples, the fruit having matured much earlier this year. The various packing plants located on the tracks at Bligen have not as yet commenced operations.

It is reported that Wood & Seaton, logging contractors operating here during the past few years, have failed. This firm had a big contract to furnish logs for the Wind River Lumber Co. at Cascade Locks. Several ranchers in the Burdoin mountain district have sustained severe losses on this account, having let contracts for cutting virgin timber on their properties. However, it's an ill wind that blows nobody good, as the mountain roads can now be repaired without fear of being ruined again this year. Dan Perry, road foreman, who covers the above district, is almost on the job.

Dewey Baylors, brother of Frank Baylors, of Portland, has arrived to care for the orchard property recently acquired of Raymond Smith, Burdoin Heights district. He was accompanied by his mother and a brother, Bert Baylors, who is a gold prospector, who will remain here until after the apple harvest.

Harvest help is coming in more freely and the little city of White Salmon is quite a busy place. Splendid business in prospect for the merchants during this fall.

Messrs. Klink and Shannon, farmers from Clatsop county, have leased the M. L. Kline ranch, consisting of 33½ acres on the old Lyle road, Burdoin Heights district. Both of these men are practical agriculturists and will try diversified farming and dairying providing they are successful in obtaining enough water on the place for their stock. The present supply is pitifully small. Mr. Klink's wife arrived here the first of the week. Klink and Shannon suggest tinkling bells; the first name also suggests dropping a piece of ice in a gin flax. These young men are an asset to any locality.

D'Anjou pears are scarce here this season and have not sized up as well as expected. Practically all of the crop will be sent to the warehouse at Underwood for pre-cooling.

C. T. Dewey is planning on the installation of a fine radio set in his moving picture house. A powerful loud speaker will be used to entertain his patrons who enjoy dance music and other forms of entertainment broadcast by the super stations. The Dewey movies are enjoying fine patronage at this time. High class pictures, especially the Harold Lloyd comedies, are proving good winners for the theatre.

Drought Hits Apples
Estimate of fall shipments of apples from Spring Lake, Ark., has been reduced from 1200 to 600 cars, according to Frisco Agent R. E. Hill who attributes the decrease to the long drought. When rains accompanied by high winds broke the drought, stems of the fruit were so brittle they snapped and hundreds of apples were dashed to the ground,

enough to load 300 cars, according to the agent.

Damage to the crop is estimated at 60 per cent or higher by Mr. Russell, while he estimates the damage for northwest Arkansas crop at 50 per cent. This has occurred during the last month. Prior to that time, officials and growers were forecasting a bumper crop and prospects were splendid for a record yield.
