**CITY STUDENTS TO STUDY RELIGION**

Plans for week-day religious instruction for all children in the Park Street school whose parents request it are being made by the Hood River City Council of Religious Education. The school board of District No. 3 has agreed to release the children on request of the parents for the period of one week during the second semester. The Council of Religious Education will employ a teacher or teachers and the instruction will be in every way up to public school standards. The work being undertaken under the laws of the state of Oregon, which provide for such cooperation between the schools and the religious forces of the community for the upbuilding of the character of the children. The work here is undertaken in response to the answers sent in reply to a questionnaire which was sent to all parents of children in the Park Street school last year; a large majority of these answers favoring such work.

The following committees of the Council of Religious Education have been appointed to make plans for the work: On curriculum, Dr. J. A. Fraser, Rev. W. O. Livingston, and the pastor of the Methodist church when appointed; on nomination of teachers, Rev. C. R. Delepine, I. R. Acheson and K. D. Peterson; on finance, F. A. Olmsted, H. B. Bennett and Ray Samuel.
