NEW CLOCK IS ERECTED

CHIMES AND ILLUMINATION APPEAL

First National Bank Last Week Installed

Timepiece Which Attracted

Favorable Comment

One afternoon last week folk of Hood River were brought to the street when the sound of sweet chiming was heard from the center of the business district. For the first time the magnificent new clock, just installed by the First National Bank, was peeling forth melodiously. The cathedral chiming, an exact duplicate of the famous chiming of Westminster, England, aroused much favorable comment. Even though a week has elapsed someone may be found almost any time of day standing beneath the clock awaiting the sounding of the chiming.

The new clock was needed in Hood River. The town has never had a clock on the side or in the tower of any public building. Already the First National clock is regulating the time of the business section.

The new chiming clock is a handsome acquisition. It is of massive construction, attached to the corner of the building. It has four large dials, about three feet in diameter, one of which can be seen from any direction. The dials at night are illuminated.

Below the faces is loaded glass paneling containing the name of the bank. Correct time is assured as the mechanism is regulated by a master clock. All operations are controlled by electricity.

It is a beautiful clock, useful to all in giving the correct time of day and night. In addition to its melodious peal. A complete set of Westminster chiming strikes each quarter hour. Various musical combinations are arranged for each quarter hour. At

quarter past the hour, four strokes are sounded—Westminster peal; at half past the hour, eight strokes—cathedral; at three quarters past the hour, 12 strokes—cathedral; at the full hour, 16 strokes—Westminster chiming, followed by the striking of the hour. In speaking of the bank's gift to the citizens of Hood River, E. O. Blanchard, president, said:

"We hope that the chiming will mean something to all our people, that they will have a message for the youngster on his way to school, a thought to the business man who hustles through the day, a solace for the old, and inspiration for all. Every day of the week the chiming will be sounding their message—the note of warning spoken in time; the chiming of rejoicing; the lament in time of sorrow. This chiming will be all these things to each and every one in our city for it is going to belong not to us alone but to the men and women and children of our community."

FIRE PREVENTION

Too many of the disastrous fires of America result from over-insurance, according to State Fire Marshal Will Moore, who was here to address the Lunch club at its meeting Tuesday at the Waukena hotel. The apathy of the general public at the staggering fire loss of America, the visitor declared, is alarming.

Mr. Moore characterized the citizens who pay the premiums of fire insurance policies as those who bear the loss from fire. He said the name insurance company is a misnomer. These companies, he declared, are really collecting and disbursing agencies.

Mr. Moore declared that citizens should give officers greater aid in bringing to court those guilty of arson. Authorities, he declared, should be aided in every way in running down this class of criminal.

"And once they are convicted and sentenced," said Mr. Moore, "for God's sake do not sign petitions for their parole."

The visitor came here at the instance of the Hood River fire department to talk on fire prevention. He was introduced by L. G. Morgan, city fire marshal. Mr. Moore praised the Hood River fire authorities for their rigid inspection of premises and their campaign of education toward preventing fire.

He cited that Clark Schoobee, executive of Boy Scouts in Hood River and Wasco counties, had offered the aid of his troops in carrying on fire prevention work. Mr. Moore said he would endeavor to secure the cooperation of scout executives throughout the state.

The annual fire loss of America is astounding, Mr. Moore said. If allowed to continue, he declared, the point is not far away when it will be to hamper the nation in its prosperity.

"If we were to see some great catastrophe," said Mr. Moore, "that caused all of the people of Hood River and The Dalles to be burned at once, you would be appalled. Yet every year that number of people lose their lives in America through fire. The annual property loss by fire reaches \$600,000,000. It would be a terrible loss, if it occurred at one time, worse even than the loss of life. I sometimes think we place more value on property than on life."

Mr. Moore cited the activity that is taken every year in the protection of forests from fire. The owners of forests are few and they are organized,

he stated, and thus they get better results in their work of prevention. The Oregon fire loss is annually \$10,000,000, said the visitor. In 1922 the state paid the biggest tax, a total of \$3,000,000, loss by \$1,000,000 than the annual fire loss.

While here Mr. Moore accompanied Fire Marshal Morgan to the schools and distributed among the children inspection blanks. The youngsters will inspect their homes and report defects to Mr. Morgan.

WRESTLING INTEREST VERY KEEN

Keen interest is being aroused here and in other mid-Columbia towns over a wrestling match scheduled for tomorrow evening at the Rialto theatre between Ted Thye, of Portland, champion light heavy weight, and Fred Mortensen, Hood River carpenter and former light heavy weight champion of Denmark. Thye was interested in a local bout following victories of Mortensen recently with Cyclone Smith, of Lewiston, Ida., and Farmer Vance, of Portland. Mortensen is one of the quickest mat artists ever seen here. He not only has the knack of gaining holds with lightning-like rapidity, but his skill at breaking away from the holds of opponents is marvelous.

Mortensen, who for five years was physical director at the gymnasium of the famed Farmer Burns, has won a general following since he came here, and a number of business men have joined hands to back him financially in staging the bout with Thye.

The crowd at the bout tomorrow night bids fair to set a record for local athletic events. Tickets are going fast. Because of the demand, arrangements have been made for a large number of ringside seats on the stage.

JUDGE CAREY TO DISCUSS WORLD COURT

When Judge Carey comes here the evening of October 21, the first program meeting of the Men's Brotherhood of Riverside church, he will take for his subject, "The World Court."

D. L. Pearson, who is arranging for the session at the parlors of the church, where a dinner will be served the next evening, said that it is the desire of his committee to have all the men of the valley interested in the subject to join the Riverside Brotherhood and hear Judge Carey, who is a gifted speaker and who is an authority on the matter of the world court. All churches of the valley have been notified that their members who wish to attend the meeting should be present.

Mr. Pearson, however, urged that it is necessary that all those who expect to attend the Brotherhood dinner and hear Judge Carey notify him at once.

IRONSIDES WEEK WILL BE LAUNCHED

"Old Ironsides" week will be in progress in Hood River county and portions of Wasco and Klickitat and Shumaker counties, Washington, next Monday. The Hood River Elks lodge will be in charge of the campaign among school children of the jurisdiction of the lodge to raise a quota of a fund to be used in rehabilitating the old U.S.S. Constitution, known as Old Ironsides. The old fighting vessel figures in much of the history of the nation's navy.

Yesterday Earl Weber and Harry Oederwall were in White Salmon, where Mr. Weber told the students of the schools there of the purposes of the campaign. Elks will give talks at assemblies of the high school and the junior high school here. An essay contest is on among the students of high schools and grade schools. Awards to the winners will be made next week.

ABOUT 75 MOTOR TO SUNDAY MEET

An approximate 75 local folk formed a motor cortege to Portland Tuesday evening when they observed Hood River day at the Billy Sunday meetings. When the plans were first broached for a crowd of local people to attend the evangelistic services, it was anticipated that many more would attend. The Hood River Woman's club is sponsoring a club institute to be held all day Wednesday, October 28, when they will be hostess to all clubs of the mid-Columbia district. Mrs. Sadie Orr Dunbar, state president, will be the leader, and conduct the institute. Representatives from the various clubs invited will lead the discussions. The topics will include every day problems of all clubs, organization, finances, programs and know your own organization.

Invitations have been sent 10 clubs, on both sides of the river, and from the responses being received the attendance will be large. Similar institute are being held all over the state, and from the enthusiasm of those which have already been held, the Hood River club feels the plan is a splendid one. A detailed program will appear next week.

Two Held for Narcotics

Tom O'Malley and Bernard Ritchie were bound over to the grand jury Monday when they were arraigned before United States Commissioner Frazer in Portland on a narcotics charge. The two were arrested here last week and in their possession was found 200 grains of yellow shoe, 105 grains of smoking opium, three pipes, a smoking lamp and other paraphernalia used by drug addicts.

They confessed they were addicts, and it was believed that they were making a girl companion an addict as well. The girl is held as a government witness, and the men were placed on \$2500 bail each.
