"Truth in Meats"

Grand Champion—Pacific International Livestock Exposition, 1924. Bred, fed and exhibited by Congdon and Battles, Yakima, Wash.

At the Pacific International Livestock Exposition to be held in Portland this year, October 31st to November 10th, it is proposed to give a demonstration which will carry out the idea of "Truth in Meats."

Assisting in this work will be the Department of Agriculture, colleges of Oregon and the Pacific slope, packing-house people, stock-yard officials and commission men, and retailers as well. Six to eight live animals, nicely bred and properly cared for, will be graded from prime to common, and the head of each will be posted on the price on foot at which its kind is selling in the stockyards that week. Directly back of them, in a refrigerator, will be shown carcasses from animals of a similar lot. These carcasses will also show the selling price from the packer to the retailer. Farther down in the refrigerator, will be shown the regular wholesale cuts of meat usually sold in the trade. These, too, will carry their proper pricing as regards the various grades.

Finally, in a counter will be seen all the retail cuts from these various packing-house lots; they in turn showing exactly what a choice cut from the choicest animal should sell for; bearing in mind all the time that the overhead in the retail store is just as much, pound for pound, on a common animal as it is on a choice one.

The purpose of this entire demonstration will not be to prove that the retailers are getting too little or too much for their meat, but rather to show the relative value of prime as compared with common meat.

ORCHARD SUBSOILING RECOMMENDED

Numerous orchardists of the valley are now practicing subsoiling, in order to break a crust that appears about six inches under the surface of the soil. Shallow cultivation, it is said, has retarded the formation of a hard crust a few inches thick, and this crust, almost like cement, has prevented the proper irrigation of orchard tracts in many sections.

Growers who have already put subsoiling into effect have secured excellent results, it is declared. Their trees, as the result of water and feeding by fertilizers applied to the soil, have yielded greater tonnage and are in a much healthier state. Fertilizer applied on tracts that have not been subsoiled is a virtual waste, it is declared.

William McGuire practiced subsoiling last year. This fall Kelly Bros. started experimenting with a subsoiler on their Kildare orchard place on the West Side. They expect to secure good results from it.

Columbia Gorge Receiver Named
On petition of owners of bonds of the Columbia Gorge Hotel Co., Circuit Judge Fred W. Wilson appointed the Portland Trust & Savings Bank as temporary receiver of the company.

Joseph Frazier, Jr., formerly city marshal here, has been placed in charge of the hotel, which was recently closed for the winter. Judge Wilson set Monday, October 19, as the date for the hearing of the case, the defendant corporation having been ordered to appear and show cause why the receivership should not be made permanent.

P. C. Scott, officer of the receiver bank, has filed with the court an affidavit to the effect that Claude Starr, head of the defendant corporation, had informed him that the corporation had an approximate \$12,000 in bank but that he had declined to turn over the funds to the receiver. Mr. Scott asked that the court order the funds produced.

Drink Offered Wrong Man
City Marshal Hart and Traffic Officer Sloat were motoring over the highway Monday. They stopped to call on friends at Cascade Locks. As Mr. Sloat walked into a place of business he met Andrew Johnson, aged fisherman of the Locks, coming forth. Johnson, apparently under the influence of liquor, offered Sloat a drink. The latter declined and Johnson commanded that he imbibe with him from a bottle of moonshine. Sloat sought to arrest the man, but he refused to be arrested. It was necessary for Sloat to call on Marshal Hart in order to quiet Johnson.

Johnson was brought here. Justice of the Peace Blagg assessed a \$50 fine.

Machine Will Vend Apples
Al W. Peters and J. R. Nunemaker and A. T. Dorsey, of White Salmon, have filed articles of incorporation with the secretary of state at Salem for the purpose of organizing a fruit vending business. The men propose to have machines manufactured for the distribution of apples. They will place the mechanical fruit stands in railway stations and other public places. The apples will be attractively displayed. It was stated, and the purchaser, in order to secure one will drop a nickel or a dime in a slot.

Travel Experiences Related

Editor Glacier: As stated previously in your columns we went east by way of the N. P. line, making eight stops over night between here and St. Paul, that we might better judge the worth of the country by seeing what it produces. By stopping off we could size up the cities.

We found the coast cities very much alive, new buildings springing up everywhere, and the surrounding country, upon which the city must depend for at least a part of its upkeep, showed signs of prosperity everywhere, while the inland cities were standing still, with but few new buildings being erected and the inhabitants more or less discouraged due to financial loss in poor crops and bank failures. Business was beginning to pick up a little, due to fair crops this year, but it is going to be slow.

Southern Minnesota and surrounding country, where we made our long stop, have good crops as compared with last year when the crop was almost an entire failure. Last fall people bought corn at \$1.35 per bushel in carload lots to feed their stock, consequently there was little or no profit; but this year stock is selling at a good figure with plenty of feed on hand to winter them. Nearly every farm possesses a fine bunch of dairy cows, which are paying well along with fattening stock, a bunch of chickens and a hundred or more hogs.

The boom in land hurt that country as it does every other country. Land is worth no more than what it will produce and is sure to seek its level in time. Silos are as common in that country as are apple houses in an orchard district and equally as beneficial as much of the crop heretofore wasted can be preserved and fed out to great advantage and profit.

The leading pastime among the people was horseshoe throwing. While Minnesota has some very good players, Oregon was well represented in most games. Needless to say we had a fine time visiting relatives and friends, some of whom we had not seen for over 40 years.

On our return trip we stopped over night and day viewing the sights of Omaha. There was a great deal of activity in putting the city in trim for the big convention of American Legion, where President Coolidge and wife were to deliver addresses. From Omaha we came on through to Denver, thence south to Colorado Springs, Pueblo, around Pike's Peak, through the Royal Gorge up to Leadville, on to Salt Lake City and home by way of the U. P. across Idaho.

The trip through Colorado and Utah may be of interest to eastern people but it means little or nothing to people living in and around Hood River, where more can be seen in one day's travel here than lifetime there. The trouble is they haven't the goods to show except on advertising sheets. Billy Sunday spoke the truth when he said Hood River valley is the garden spot of the world and the home of a contented people.

Everywhere people were talking and asking about the Mt. Hood Loop road and the Columbia River highway, and if I mistake not this Northwest country will see a very large influx of people in the next few years seeking not only pleasure but homes.
