BOY SCOUT NEWS

The first fall meeting of the Scoutmaster's roundtable has been called by Scout Executive Schouboe for next Thursday at 5:45 p. m. at the Waukoma hotel. All men whether now active as scoutmasters and troop committees, or if not definitely connected with scout work, are invited to attend this meeting. It is expected that the discussions will center around the newly standardized scout tests, arranged by the commissioner and Mr. Schouboe. Troop programs will also be dealt with, model programs being presented by the scout executive.

Friday afternoon at 4:30 the boys of the Christian church will meet with Rev. Livingston and Scout Executive Schouboe to arrange for registration of the troop. All boys who have been attending the preliminary meetings of this new troop are invited by Rev. Livingston to attend this charter meeting.

Study of the possibilities of organizing a junior fire marshal brigade among the first class scouts of Hood River is being taken up by Fire Marshal Morgan and the scout officials. The system of using these especially trained older Boy Scouts for fire hazard inspection work has been used very successfully in many communities. Peoria, Ill., has at the present time over 200 first class scouts enlisted in this work, each boy having received special training in fire prevention work. This efficient force has materially assisted the regular fire marshals of the city in reducing the number of residential fires, and also the loss among those started.

Master troop No. 1 came into existence last Wednesday, when a new troop of Boy Scouts was organized there by Scout Executive Schouboe and L. F. Blanchard, superintendent of schools. Mr. Blanchard is acting as scoutmaster. The time of the first meeting was devoted to setting up three patrols, each with a leader. Following this, Mr. Schouboe explained the scout oath and laws, and the meeting closed with several rope games, using the tenderfoot knots practiced during the evening. The school board of Mosier is sponsoring the troop.

Registration of the Frankton Boy Scout troop with national headquarters was undertaken at the meeting of the troop last Monday, when Scout Executive Schouboe met with the boys and spoke to them on "The Why of Scouting." Mr. Ballard, scoutmaster of the troop, passed several boys in their tenderfoot tests, following a few demonstrations in rope work, and the reading of the scout oath. The troop committee was represented by Geo. Gallaway and Mr. Miller. Howard Miller and another tenderfoot scout passed their second class signaling under the direction of Executive Schouboe. Mr. Schouboe will be present next Monday to complete the registration of the troop.

FINS, FURS AND FEATHERS

Two small boys of the Heights residence section thought they had found a police dog when they discovered a large animal seeking food in their back yard. They secured a rope and tied the animal to a back porch column. A few hours later their mother learned that a tame wolf had escaped from C. O. Huelat, custodian of the city auto camp. The small boys lost their dog right there.

The wolf is full grown but is declared an extremely good disposition and fond of children. Mr. Huelat, who has no place for the animal at the park during the winter months, is seeking a home for it.

J. Sellers, West Side rancher, was fined \$25 Monday by Justice of the Peace Blagg for hunting China pheasants without a license. It was the first case of the hunting season.

Fishing on the White Salmon river is not so good now as it was two weeks ago. Several local anglers, including C. T. Ellsworth, Ivan Schear and L. G. Morgan, who were on the White Salmon Sunday, had but indifferent luck.

Jack Bell, rancher on upper Mosier creek, Monday brought to the Holman & Samuel market the carcass of a 200-pound bear, killed near his home. While spearing the animal, the bear was considerably browner than found ordinarily. The bear was rolling fat and scores of families plan bear roasts for Sunday dinner.

While dozens of local hunters last week killed the limit of China pheasants in local orchards and the open spaces surrounding the valley, birds are rare this week. After the first few days of hunting the China became very wary and immediately seek the higher elevations where dense underbrush and forest make successful hunting a near impossibility.

Liquor Possession Brings Fine
Justice of the Peace Blagg Monday assessed a fine of \$100 and costs against E. L. Barnes, Cascade Locks resident, on a charge of liquor possession. Officers last week raided the Barnes home, finding a dismantled still. Barnes denied that he had made liquor. Barnes was said to own a Troutdale farm. He was formerly construction foreman for the O.-W. R. & N. Co. in the mid-Columbia.
