ABIE'S IRISH ROSE COMING TO RIALTO

Fifteen successful plays in seven years. This is the record of Miss Anne Nichols, the author of "Abie's Irish Rose," which has swept through the United States from coast to coast with unprecedented success. It is now in its fourth year at the Republic theatre, New York, and comes to the Rialto theatre next Wednesday evening, November 4.

Miss Nichols was born in Georgia some 30 odd years ago. She went to school in Philadelphia and traditionally ran away to go on the stage. There were years of struggle on the road, barn storming, going out on one-night stands, also playing roundabout western leads in the movies. Finally came the chance to help fix up a play that was weak in its comedy lines. Then a vaudeville sketch, her first success. Her other successes are "Just Married," "Linger Longer Letty" and "A Little Bit Old Fashioned." Miss Nichols is the head of her own production company and directs and writes her own plays. Although a thorough business woman she still has time to bring up a five year old son.

New York actor artists, assisted by a bevy of pretty bridesmaids and an exact and heavy duplication of the New York scenic production is carried in a special 70-foot stage, the only time since fruit started to rolling in September.

In normal seasons all apples have not been picked by November 1. All fruit, however, this season was under cover a week ago, and most growers have completed their packing. Receipts of apples and pears by the Apple Growers Association up to Saturday had reached 992,948 boxes. The association had shipped 533,888. The cooperative organization last year received from its growers more than 2,000,000 boxes of fruit.

All shipping concerns are now cutting their shipping crews. The total shipments of the district, it is estimated, will not be far in excess of 1,500 cars.

Fruit Exports May Be Short

With the best refrigerator service available in Portland's history as a shipping port, indications are that a considerable amount of apples will be begging for fruit this season. A number of cancellations on space have already been made.

Reports are current that a considerable amount of fruit that ordinarily would be exported, will be sold on the domestic market, due to good home prices. The refrigerator steamer schedule from Portland this fall has a great number of sailings and closely spaced giving exporters a chance to regulate the flow of their fruit.

PEAK OF APPLE SHIPMENTS OVER

The peak of the apple shipping season is over. About 25 cars per day are rolling here now. A car shortage existed the past week, the only time since fruit started to rolling in September.

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SEVENTY DOLLARS CUT ON STAR CARS

With the second price cut of \$70 on the Star coupe within the past two months only announced two weeks ago, a recent factory communication shows a sales increase that will shatter the record breaking mark established by this model during the past months. A similar sensational increase in sales for these two closed models is now a foregone conclusion.

SUPT. WEBB TELLS OF KIDDIES' HOME

An address of G. T. "Daddy" Webb, superintendent of the Children's Farm Home at Corvallis, was the climax of Thursday's session of the 42nd annual convention of the Oregon W. C. T. U. here. For 25 minutes Mr. Webb, in a conversational tone, told the women of the simple little incidents of the life at the institution, established to provide a real home for the dependent children of the state, and many, many times did the women wipe the tears from their eyes.

"It is our aim," said Mr. Webb, "to provide not merely the necessities of life, housing, accommodations, playgrounds, school and laws for them to romp over, but we try to pour into the lives of the children a little bit of love."

Mr. Webb praised the work of the house mothers of the various cottages. Only women are accepted for this responsibility, he said, who have an actual capacity for mothering the children. While Mr. Webb was in the midst of his talk a telegram was delivered to him, which will bring an expression of appreciation to the W. C. T. U. from the boys of the home.

The farm has designated, Mr. Webb said, a special school district and a \$35,000 school has been provided for the children, who received the instruction of the Oregon public school system. As for religious teaching, said Mr. Webb, that is lived day by day.

"We are old-fashioned at the farm, and every morning at the breakfast table, one of the children may be seen going for the Bible, that the house-mother may read a chapter, and then she or the children will give a prayer. It is just old-fashioned family worship. We have Sunday school every Sunday with Mrs. Webb in charge, but we do not believe in sermonizing. We try to try to religion 365 days in the year and that really gets us somewhere."

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SUBSTITUTES FOR NEWTOWNS PROPOSED

The apple market appears to be in sound condition at the present time, but the source of prices is somewhat uncertain in the opinion of dealers. Prices are firm enough in the northwest, and in the light of recent eastern auction results may be considered probably the most profitable counts for the slowing down of buying at interior f. o. b. points.

The shortage of export sizes of Newtowns is causing some concern to shippers and there are indications of buying of other varieties to fill sales, which may be one of the factors giving the northwestern markets their strength. The recent weakness abroad is attributed to an over-supply of low grade English stock. When these apples are out of the way, which cable advices indicate will not be long delayed, Pacific coast shippers may expect relatively little competition from continental apples.

Weekly Market Review on Apples

As an indication of the earliness of the harvesting season and of confidence in the future market, the October 18 storage report showed 555,000 barrels and over 1,000,000 boxes of apples all ready in cold storage. An interesting feature is the reported holding of 500,000 bushels of eastern apples in baskets, compared with 100,000 the year before. Aggregate cold storage stocks were 65 per cent less than those of October 1, 1924, and far above the 2-year average.

The advance of prices in British markets was an encouraging event of the week. Closing rates on barrels from eastern United States was about \$5.10 to \$5.50, compared with \$4 to \$7.25 on similar stock the week before. Lighter offerings and cooler weather are suggested as the causes. Boxed apples were unsteady, but gave evidence of improvement. A few sales were made at an advance of 30 cents to 50 cents.

Home markets quoted best eastern Rock Imperials at \$4 to \$5 per barrel; New York Redstreaks and Spys held the same range. Best mid-western Jonathans sold around \$7 and Delicious at \$8. Basket stock ruled \$1.25 to \$2.50 according to source and variety. Extra fancy Jonathans from the northwest were quoted mostly at \$2.25 to \$3 with Delicious bringing \$3 to \$4. Michigan and Potomac valley f. o. b. prices showed a firm tone, and best packs of Baldwins advanced in western New York shipping sections. Demand was slow on the western slope of Colorado, rains interfering with picking. Movement from eastern and mid-western apple regions increased 700 cars, but western shipments decreased slightly, making the week's combined output 9,900 cars.
