First Killing Frost Saturday Night
The first killing frost of the season struck lower levels of the mid-Columbia Saturday night, leaving flower gardens and late vegetable trucks withered after the brilliant sunshine struck them. The minimum temperature reached 20 degrees, the lowest of the season.

Sunday was calm and hundreds of motorists took advantage of the weather to make a final tour over the Mount Hood Loop highway. Toward night a strong, cold west wind began driving banks of clouds up from the coast, and weather prophets predicted an early snowfall for the orchard section.

The falling weather expected, however, did not materialize. A light shower prevailed Monday night, clearing the atmosphere. Yesterday was brilliantly clear.

ORGANIZATION WILL BOOST LOOP AREA

A group of men who own property along the Mount Hood Loop highway in Hood River and Clackamas counties held a meeting at Government Camp last week, according to word brought here Saturday by Gilbert Edgington, who was accompanied by William Moody, J. B. Demmon and Ralph Davies, of the Upper Valley. Officers elected were: J. T. Broderick, of Portland, president; Paul Spaulding, of Sandy, secretary-treasurer; and Jack Greenwood, of Sandv, vice president.

The new organization will endeavor to bring about a beautification of the country adjoining the highway. The forestry service will be asked to remove all snags and other forest debris. E. S. Collins, Portland lumberman, wrote the organization and urged that it back a movement to have the roadside between Government Camp and the forest boundary planted with rhododendrons.

Mr. Edgington said that the organization recommended the construction of a horse trail to connect the Loop highway with Eden park.

The per capita consumption of apples in the United States is now about half an apple a day, says the United States Department of Agriculture.

The total crop this year will reach 164,000,000 bushels compared with 179,000,000 bushels last year. The decrease in total production, however, is partially offset by the fact that the crop is of unusually fine quality, and less than the usual proportion will go to waste or be used for manufacturing purposes. The portion known as the commercial crop will reach 30,134,000
