APPLES CARRYING JOY TO KIDDIES

Apples by the thousands have been making the kiddies in a score of Portland orphanages and hospitals happy this week.

It is Apple Week and one of the chief activities of the week of the committees in charge is to provide apples for children in charitable institutions and for inmates of hospitals.

Three hundred boxes, dedicated by the Hood River apple growers and jobbers of Portland have been distributed by truckloads. First load went to the Shrine hospital; the next to the Albertina Kerr nursery and the third to the Veterans' hospital. Not an orphanage or a charitable institution in Portland was neglected. The Junior league participated in the distribution.

Everybody in Portland has been eating apples this week. A person will not be able to find a restaurant, a cafe or a dining room that is not featuring apple dishes on menus, and housewives in the homes are serving apple sauce, baked apples, apple dumplings, apple jelly and in some instances apple cider.

Apples were distributed at the members' forum of the chamber of commerce Monday, and apple pie and other apple dishes were featured on the menu. E. E. Paville, chairman of the agricultural committee of the Portland chamber, gave an Apple Week talk over the radio Monday night.

POWER COMPANY HAS NEW SHOW TRUCK

A handsome new Chevrolet truck put into commission in the mid-Columbia by the Pacific Power & Light Co., to stimulate an interest on the part of rural folk in electrical appliances for the household has created considerable attention lately. A. L. Day is in charge of the truck, which will be operated in Hood River, Wasco and Sherman counties and Klickitat county, Washington.

"Mr. Day will be a kind of electrical appliance advisor for the folk of these four counties," said H. E. Baker, local P. & L. district manager. "The truck is equipped so that he can transport and demonstrate labor saving mechanism. He will come in contact with the rural folk, however, in the way of an advisor and to give them suggestions and information on how to make practical and economic application of the appliances that are now on the market."

WOMAN'S MEETING WAS SUCCESSFUL

With club women present from all member towns to the number of 150, the Hood River Woman's club Wednesday of last week held one of the most successful club institutes ever given in the state, according to Mrs. Sadie Orr Dunbar, state president, who was here for the event.

The institute was held under the leadership of Mrs. Charles H. Castner, past president of the state federation, and a past president of the local club. Able presentation of the topics under discussion was made by Mrs. W. W. Rodwell and Mrs. H. G. Cooper, of the local club, and by Mrs. Nell Stadlerman, of The Dalles; Dr. Richelieu of Wasco; Miss Elvce Creelcus of White Salmon, and others. Mrs. Dunbar was an able leader, and was loud in her praise of the details worked out for the institute.

Krieg Building Community House
Ed Krieg has been awarded construction of a new \$10,000 community house to be built by Japanese orchardists of the valley. The plans are now constructing forms for the concrete basement. The house will rise on West Sherman.

It is planned that the new building will be completed before the first of the year, when Japanese of the community will stage a New Year's celebration. The grounds of the community house will be landscaped like gardens of Nippon.

Tire Shop Building Rising
Hal Nesbit is now engaged in the construction of a hollow tile, one-story building on Oak street, opposite the Rialto theater, where he will house his Tire Shop business. On completion of the building he will be able to operate his tire shop and his service station more conveniently. His new service station has become one of the most popular of the city.
