Airline Notes

Complete and mysterious silence marks the expected opening of Portland's new radio station. The Portland Telegram alone makes mention of the lack of advance information regarding the opening day visit. We have no further information to offer but expect announcement daily. The way length of 213 meters is in the Class A wave band and many fans will be disappointed by their sets not tuning down to this wave length.

Never did we hear such power noise as assailed our ears during the last week. Several callers have suggested means of abating the nuisance by get-

ting up a petition and forwarding copies to the Seventh District radio inspector, O. R. Redfern. We wonder if it has occurred to our local power company that profit, from even 50 radio fans who use the midnight electricity for light and battery charging, amounts to a considerable monthly item. We suggest that it is greatly in their interests to cooperate with the radio public in providing better conditions for reception. Removal of tree limbs, change of lines and insulators help but do not remove the steady roar which comes direct from the Powerdale plant. There is a distinct directional effect in Hood River valley. Southeastern stations form the majority of long distance logs. Directly east is the most difficult direction for results. Visiting fans from southern Idaho remark on the limitation of reception here. Has anyone here ever heard Boston, Mass., from here?
