POULTRY SHOW NEXT WEEK

MANY BIRDS WILL BE EXHIBITED

Indications Point to Display of 500 Birds

Some of Which Have Taken Blue Ribbons at Big Shows

Edward Thornton, who is making arrangements for the annual Hood River country poultry show, scheduled for November 19, 20 and 21, says that more than 500 birds will be entered. The orchardists of the Mosier fruit section have been asked to participate in the show this year. Competitors of the city have donated goods for presentation as first and second prizes. A white ribbon will be given third award. C. B. Brewster, formerly poultry expert at the Oregon Agricultural College, will be judge. Mr. Thornton says that practically every known breed of chicken will be represented at the show. Competitors, he says, will be keen, as some of the birds to be shown have taken blue ribbons at the Oregon state fair and the Pacific International livestock exposition.

The show will be held in the frame building on Fourth street, owned by the Parla Palm; just above Hal's Service Station.

Mr. Thornton asks that all interested in the show get in touch with him at once.

MORTENSEN WILL MEET BARNES SOON

Fred Mortensen, the carpenter-wrestler, known as the Durable Dane, who has aroused staid Hood River to a pitch of enthusiasm the past several weeks with his prowess on the mat, will hold his next bout here on the evening of Wednesday, November 18, when he will meet Frankie Barnes, of Detroit, who recently was defeated in a bout with Red Gage in Portland. Many Portland fans are firm in their opinion that Barnes, were he to get another chance at the Portland champion, would lay him low.

Mortensen lost to Thye here week before last. Hood River fans have not recovered from the disappointment of that bout. Mortensen took the first fall in 55 minutes of grilling wrestling. When the men were in for their second try, Mortensen, who hurled from the mat, struck his head against a radiator. The blow stunned him, and he was easy meat after that for the Portland champion. The Hood River fans were left firm in their belief, however, that Mortensen could have downed Thye but for the accident. The bout will be held at the gymnasium, where a platform has been erected from the floor will be constructed.

Keen interest is centering in the coming bout between Mortensen and Barnes because of the assurance that Mortensen will win. Mortensen, of Portland, will range for a bout between the winner and Champion Thye in Portland in the near future. Mortensen has also received a call to go to Newberg for a bout.

Mortensen was introduced to the athletic scene of Longview, whom he addressed briefly, telling them of the wonders of the scenery of the Mount Hood district and adjacent to the Loop highway. He passed the local folk for their interest in sports. The Longview News gave him a lengthy story. It was reported that Barnes was unable to meet Thye in a match scheduled at the Hotel there last week because of a stroke. This was an error. The Michigan star had strained his hip severely while repairing his automobile. He failed to meet the champion because of this injury, from which he has entirely recovered.

THE DALLIES TAKES ANNUAL HIGH GAME

The Dallis high school won the annual high school football classic of the mid-Columbia from Hood River last Friday afternoon. The game, played on the Dallis field, was declared one of the best high school games of the state this season. Teams were evenly matched, and the first quarter was characterized as perfect football. The Hood River high school closed for the afternoon and the student body and most of the business folk of the city were present to see the game.

George Cooper says in The Dallis Chronicle: "The game was largely a punting duel between Thompson of Hood River and Glavey, these two boys booting a total of 50 punts during the four quarters.

In spite of the small score, the contest was one of the best seen from the viewpoint that has been played on the home field this season.

The Dallis backfield, in previous games on a par with the line, and with any scoring combination in the state, fell behind the work of the front rank, which held the heavy Apple City van-guard like the proverbial stone wall. Hood River made first downs but times during the game, and but two of these from scrimmage, the other resulting from a wide lateral pass.

Glavey, who made his first brilliant start in the Corvallis game and held the post in good style against Pendleton, did not show to such advantage yesterday. Substitute "Pickles" Morant went in for Blane in the middle of the third quarter when the latter was injured, and within four minutes had crashed through for 25- and 15-yard gains, the latter netting the lone score. The entire first period was a punting battle, the two quarters delivering 12 exchanges. Not a first down was made during the quarter. Glavey showed a slight edge on distance, the bulk of the quarter radiating between Hood River's 20-yard line and midfield. Near the end of the session Glavey was nipped far behind the line on an attempted end run, and punted, the gun ending the period.

The last quarter was played largely in the Dallis territory, with Hood River trying hard to even the score.

W. J. A. BAKER OFF FOR LOS ANGELES

W. J. A. Baker, accompanied by his family, left last week for Los Angeles, Calif., where he will take charge of the office of the Apple Growers Association.

Mr. Baker succeeds C. W. Hooker in charge of the Association business in the southwest. Mr. Baker is the son of W. J. Baker, a pioneer orchardist, who over 35 years ago planted this district's first New town commercial orchard tract. He knows the apple game from the bottom up. He had an experience on the orchard place in culture and packing fruit, and later he entered the inspection department of the Association. Two years ago the cooperative organization put Mr. Baker on the road with a demonstration truck. He visited various sections in the southwest, going thence to the lower middle west and south. His work resulted in opening a new market for Hood River apples in many smaller cities of those sections.

ELKS' FAMILIES ENJOY BIG PARTY

No merrier party has ever been staged than that given by the Elks lodge last Friday evening for families of members. It was estimated that 500 were present. Elks and their families were present from Mosier, White Salmon and Underwood.

LEGION HOLDS CELEBRATION

VETERANS TO CHARGE OF TOWN

Sports Were Features of Observing Armistice Day by Hood River Folk—Fights Draw Crowd

World War Veterans' Day in Hood River yesterday. From 7 o'clock, when reveille was sounded and the American Legion post drum and bugle corps paraded the streets until midnight, the boys who fought the battles of 1917 and 1918 were owners of the town.

While the morning was fairly clear, after a heavy rain during the night, clouds drifted up from the west during the afternoon and put somewhat of a damper on the football game played at Gibson field between the Camas, Wash., and Hood River high school teams. Despite the precipitation, the crowd out for the game was a near record.

Before the football game the Legion post and Boy Scouts participated in a formal flag raising at a new 60-foot pole at the athletic grounds. The straight fir was raised the day before by a crew of the Pacific Power & Light Co. The Pythian band and drum and bugle corps gave a concert and staged drills before the game.

The Hault theatre was packed yesterday morning for boxing matches. Not a single bout was settled with a knockout. Young Rogers, of Iona, came near felling Soldier Henning of Vancouver, Wash., for the count several times. While the youth of the Doe boy and his strength were too much for the soldier, the latter won the audience by his gameness. His nose was punched repeatedly, and the blood was smeared over his face and upper body. Henning showed staying qualities and a science and remained standing in the ring until the end of the last of the 10 rounds. Other events resulted as follows:

Hatch and Wells, local boys, went four rounds for a draw; the Panama Kid, of Portland, was given the decision in six rounds against Benito Alvarez, local Filipino; Memphis Bishop, of Portland, was given the decision in a six-round mill with Nat Bea, of the Dallis. Members of the Grand Army, honor guests of the Legion post, occupied seats on the stage at the ringside. They showed a keen interest in the bouts.

The annual Overseas Veterans' stag banquet was held at 6:30 o'clock at the Odd Fellows hall, and the day ended with a big ball at the Pythian temple.

FUNERAL FOR MRS. WATT ON MONDAY

Funeral services for Mrs. Jennie Benton Watt, wife of Dr. J. F. Watt, retired pioneer physician of this city who for many years was district surgeon for the O. R. & N. and O. W. R. & N. companies, were held Monday afternoon at 1 o'clock at the Portland Crematorium. Rev. W. G. Eliot, pastor of the Church of Our Father, officiated. The body was taken to Portland over the Columbia River highway Monday morning by E. R. Hartman.

Mrs. Watt, who had been seriously ill for more than a week, died Saturday night at the home of her sister, Mrs. W. M. Stewart. She was 64 years old and a native of Georgetown, Maine.

Mrs. Watt's father, the late R. L. Smith, was a pioneer of Olympia, Wash., having been secretary and acting prior of Washington territory for many years. Her mother was a pioneer leader among Oregon club women. Mrs. Watt and her children in memory of their mother, gave the city the site for the county library, the oak covered plot adjoining their old home in the city. Mrs. Watt was one of the valley's best loved matrons. When her husband retired from active practice several years ago, Mrs. Watt and Dr. Watt moved from the city to a West Side orchard place.

In addition to Mrs. Stewart, Mrs. Watt leaves two other sisters: Mrs. Georgiana Rand, of this city, and Mrs. Ann Nelson, of Portland. Mrs. Watt was possessed of a love for little children and for flowers. She took a keen interest in the welfare of neighborhood little ones. Mrs. Watt not only loved the domestic flower as grown in pots and the home garden, but she delighted in visiting the native woodlands and gathering wild flowers. Her gift at the arrangement of flowers, used in decorating homes or at some public function, was remarkable, and many times her touches of artistry, due to her seeming understanding of plants, was noted at the library hall and other meeting places.

DEATH CALLED MRS. BAKER YESTERDAY

Mrs. W. J. Baker, one of the valley's most loved pioneer matrons, died at her home at 2:30 a. m. yesterday. Mrs. Baker, aged 71, was a native of Pennsylvania.

Funeral services await advice from a son and daughter in Los Angeles. Services, however, will be held. It was stated, at the St. Mary's Episcopal church, of which Mrs. Baker had long been an active member. Mrs. Baker is survived by her husband and the following children: Mrs. Glenn Deuser and W. J. A. Baker, of Los Angeles; Mrs. Burt Wilson, of Portland; and Mrs. Harry T. DeWitt and Mrs. Allyn Butten, of Hood River.

Mr. and Mrs. Baker came to Hood River before orcharding here was launched. Indeed, Mr. Baker and his wife, who for many years lived on a place on Brookside drive, planted this district's first commercial orchard tract of Newtown apples. Their fruit, exhibited at various early day world's fairs, brought the northwest its first fame as an apple producing center. Mrs. Baker was active in her church work and in the Eastern Star chapter here. She was president of the Past Matrons' club of the order. News of her death brought general expressions of genuine grief.
