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A PECULIAR COINCIDENCE NOTICED

A peculiar coincidence in the death of two brothers, both of whom had the same initials, C. A., has just been learned by the family of the late C. A. Puddy, pioneer local Upper Valley orchardist, who died here at 2:30 a. m. November 4. The local family has just received a clipping from the Missouri Valley News, telling of the accidental death of the brother of that place at 2 p. m. the same day. He was engaged with car repairs and fell, breaking his neck.

The clipping was as follows: "C. A. Puddy was instantly killed this afternoon when he fell from a box car and broke his neck. With other car repairs, he was working in a double deck car, putting in the upper deck. He was lifting on this deck when it turned, throwing him out of the car door and he struck on his head. Dr. Jense was immediately called and he pronounced him dead, his neck having been broken."

"Mr. Puddy was very well and favorably known here, where he had resided for many years."

Jury Urges Boze Be Locked Up

The grand jury, which finished its labors in a day in circuit court here Monday, in a report to Judge Wilson observed that Sheriff Edick keeps contraband liquor in a vault with an open door. The grand jurors declared that looters around the court house might be tempted to pilfering. They recommended that the sheriff keep a complete record of such seizures and that all be constantly under lock and key.

The jury also recommended that court house doors be changed. The report observed that they now open to the inside of the building. "The court house," said the report, "is the only public building in the county with illegal doors."

Keithley, a Gresham resident, was suing to collect notes alleged to have been given Mrs. Keithley, maternal aunt of young Bailey and wife. The defense maintained that the notes had been partly paid and that the deceased woman had agreed before her death to a cancellation of the balance, provided the defendants cared for her burial expenses.

STEADY RAIN COMES TO BREAK DROUTH

A steady rain began Monday night. The precipitation at 6 o'clock Tuesday night reached 1.08 inches. The rain brought down numerous small slides of rock along the Columbia River highway, slowing down traffic but in no instance causing a blockade.

The rain was welcomed by orchardists, who expressed the hope that the earth will be thoroughly soaked before freezing weather sets in. Except for intermittent light showers in late September and October, aggregating about an inch, the rain was the first since last May.

Mid-Columbia power concerns welcomed the rain, for streams were at the lowest ebb in history.

million children in its public school classes. Chicago has to its credit more than half a million. So it goes throughout the country. This is the contribution which our public schools are making to the nation. It is the country's investment in its future.

The broad diffusion of education brings into conspicuous view the force of the dominating idea of the nation—equality of opportunity. Education is not confined to "white collars." Scholarly training penetrates farm, factory and workshop. Hundreds of thousands are subjected to its influence in night classes, extension classes, part-time classes, correspondence courses and, at home, by radio. It makes education—as is proper in a nation founded on democracy—democratic.

This spread of learning calls for an equalization in our social status and education must establish it. Existing social classifications can hardly survive the present leveling influence of literacy. In this country, where a laborer today becomes a bank president tomorrow; where a shop mechanic lifts himself to motor magnate; where the self-made rise suddenly from obscurity to eminence, there is needed a new social recognition for all honorable occupations. Educational tendencies must not be controlled by, but must control that social standing.

Education is the great leveller. It is breaking down the barriers between those who toil by hand and those who labor by brain; it is tearing down the wall that separates the socially elevated from those of humble origin. Step by step this country is moving in the evolution of a new measure for social value — worth rather than wealth — where if there be any aristocracy at all, it will be an aristocracy of brains. It is tending more and more to become the world's true index of value. For in every occupation men and women are measured by their works, and the quality of their work is in the main
