Harpham, proprietor of the Ocoee national forest, plans for relieving the range of the surplus number of wild horses that roam over the hills of Ocoee, Grant, Harney and Wheeler counties.

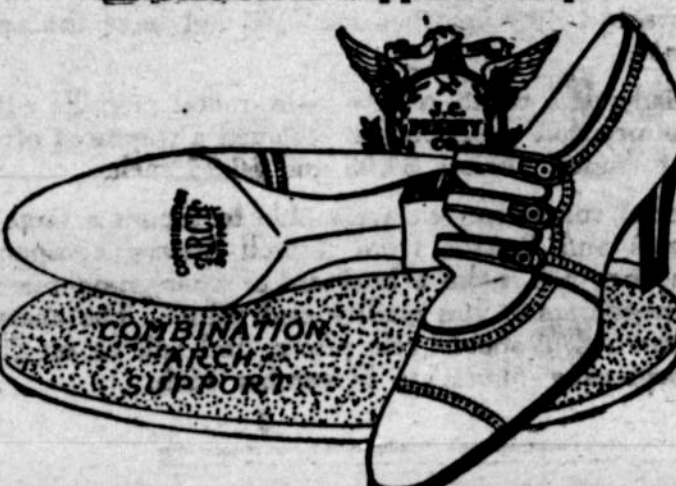
