BOY SCOUTS WILL BOOST HOSPITAL

Miss Jeanice Turner, talented dramatic soprano, will be presented in concert December 1 for the benefit of the Hood River hospital. The concert is being given at the high school under the auspices of the Boy Scouts, who will turn all profits over to the Hood River hospital for the purchase of the new sterilizer recently installed. Miss Turner made her debut in Italy where she sang with great success, winning notable mention from music critics there. "In 'Amico Fritz' a young American soprano, Miss Jeanice Turner, captivated San Remo. It is not often an American singer so young sings with such feeling and finesse." The Teatro, Milan, says: "Miss Jeanice Turner, a young American soprano, sang Verdi with a beautiful voice. She was well received. She has a voice of great range which she uses remarkably well." The Portland Oregonian, comments: "Miss Turner, who made her debut in opera in Italy last year, sang 'L'entrata Della Butterfly' (Puccini) with splendid style and finish. The dramatic quality in her voice showed to advantage in two modern Italian numbers. The group of English songs were late compositions by the well-known composer, Louis Victor Saar."

Other critics give Miss Turner equally cordial notices. The Bellingham American, on the occasion of Miss Turner's return to her home, said: "A brilliant and enthusiastic audience greeted Jeanice Turner, the beautiful and talented young dramatic soprano. Miss Turner has also sung with great success at a number of concerts throughout the United States. She is concert soprano for the Apollo club, a men's musical chorus, of Detroit. Her voice is used with rare intelligence, beautiful effects having been achieved throughout her very wide range, with an excellent quality of tone. In addition, Miss Turner has a good understanding of vocal literature as shown on her numerous programs. Miss Sara Howes, a Hood River girl, formerly organist at Riverside church, will be at the piano. Miss Howes has been meeting with much success as an accompanist while in Portland. She has already played two concerts for Miss Turner. This concert sponsored by the Boy Scouts is in the nature of a "good turn" to the Hood River hospital. Members of the Scout troops will assist in selling tickets, as individual good turns to the hospital. Albert Case is chairman of committee in charge of the concert, assisted by members of the local Scout executive committee. A morning concert at the high school will be given by Miss Turner the Tuesday of her appearance, to the students, because of her interest in musical development among young people.
