IDEAL GRADER CO.

BUILDING PLANT

Work was started last week on a new 100 by 100-foot factory for the Ideal Grader Co. on the orchard place of the owner, August Guignard, just south of the city. The structure, which will be well lighted, will be of frame and concrete. Mr. Guignard, who a number of years ago invented an apple grading machine to handle his own fruit crop, found that his neighbors would like a similar contrivance. From this modest beginning, his grader factory has grown rapidly, and now scores of the machines are turned out annually.

They have been shipped to Australia and South Africa, and the Ideal grader is known throughout northwest Oregon and California deciduous fruit districts. Mr. Guignard employs a crew of about 20 men and women. Albert Krieg was awarded the contract for building the new plant, which Mr. Guignard says is but the first unit of a much larger structure.

The Apple Growers Association which reported last week end that it had received from its growers a total of 1,208,873 boxes of apples and pears, had shipped 780,354 boxes. All fruit not shipped, it estimated had been placed in cold storage.

Mr. Guignard states that he expects 80,000 feet of seasoned pine lumber in the construction of graders the coming year. Seventeen thousand feet of special belting are awaiting manufacture into belts on the graders.

ARE SLOWING DOWN

Apple shipments are decreasing materially. During the past week, the daily movement has been from 10 to 15 cars. Total shipment of apples and pears have reached 1,415 cars. The total for the two varieties will reach an approximate 2,250 cars.

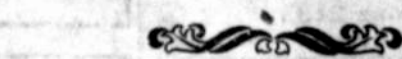
