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ODD FELLOWS HOLD MORTGAGE BURNING

Wednesday evening, November 18, the members of Idlewild Lodge No. 107 and Laurel Rebekah Lodge No. 87 held a joint celebration, the purpose of which was to burn the mortgage on their building. A brief resume of the history of the I. O. O. F. lodges follows:

Idlewild Lodge No. 107, I. O. O. F., was instituted August 23, 1891, with the following charter members: H. J. Hibbard, L. Neff, Geo. A. Herbert, M. P. Watson and A. B. Jones. Past Grand Master O. P. Doane, a member of Columbia Lodge No. 5, of The Dalles, having been appointed by the grand master, was instituting officer. The following members were elected and installed as officers: H. J. Hibbard, N. G.; M. P. Watson, V. G.; A. B. Jones, secy., and L. Neff, treas.

After the initiation and installation of officers the following names were handed in and after due consideration were elected to membership, after which they were initiated as members: T. J. Watson, E. W. Udell, W. D. Perry, H. L. Curran, S. W. Curran, L. E. Morse, R. F. Hardwick, L. McIntyre, Wm. Ellison and J. E. Hanna. The total receipts for the evening were \$235.

M. P. Watson, A. B. Jones and Wm. Ellison were the first trustees of Idlewild lodge. Thursday evening of each week was selected as their regular meeting night. The lodge hall was rented from Perry & Jones, who were operating a meat market on the lower floor of the old frame building that now stands on the west side of Fourth street opposite the present hall, it having been moved there to make room for our new home. The rental paid at that time was \$10 per month. The hall was sub-rented at a little later date to the A. O. U. W. lodge for \$5 per month. This arrangement continued until 1895 when the lodge began to feel that it should own a home of its own.

February 6, 1896, L. E. Morse and M. P. Sloper were appointed as a committee to look up the matter of securing a permanent home for the lodge. February 27 they reported that they were in favor of buying the Perry & Jones building, their present quarters. The report was accepted and the committee empowered to close the deal. The trustees at this time were S. E. Bartness, Thos. Lacey and L. Neff. The officers were O. B. Hartley, N. G. and J. H. Ferguson, V. G. The matter was taken up with the Masonic lodge and in April, 1896, the Masonic lodge and Idlewild lodge jointly purchased the property from A. B. Jones for the sum of \$1,000, giving their joint notes for security. In 1900 the Masons decided to move to their present location and in 1901 sold their interest in the property to Idlewild lodge for \$832. The lodge borrowed \$800 from Wm. H. Hendricks, giving a note for the amount. The trustees, H. J. Hibbard, J. H. Ferguson and J. E. Hanna, signed the note for the lodge.

The records show that at this time the meeting were taking considerable interest as there was degree work at nearly every meeting. The members came on foot to the meetings from as far out as Odell. Thos. Lacey, living in Odell at that time, seldom missed a meeting. Other members came from the Barrett district and from the East Side. Rain, mud and snow had no terror for these brothers who knew that if the order was to grow it was up to all hands to put their shoulders to the wheel and push.

In 1896 the need of a Rebekah branch of the order to the members of Idlewild lodge, they began to organize a Rebekah lodge, and May 22, 1897, Laurel Rebekah Lodge No. 87 was instituted. Their trials and hardships were many, but they have shown a steady and rapid growth and now their membership is over the 150 mark. No small amount of credit is due the faithful sisters of Laurel Rebekah lodge for the many helpful deeds performed in helping the Odd Fellows equip their hall and make it more homelike and pleasant for all who attend.

May 19, 1903, Eden Encampment No. 48 was instituted. This branch of the order has shown a steady growth until it has a membership of 90. Today Eden Encampment is considered one of the liveliest and best encampments in the jurisdiction of Oregon.

In 1905 it became necessary that a more suitable and better building be secured and the matter was discussed and finally in 1906 it was decided to erect the present building and the trustees were empowered to go ahead with the new building. The sum of \$10,200 was borrowed to go toward the erection of the new building. The total amount of money in the treasury at this time was \$472.25 and there was another debt on the property besides the amount borrowed, making a total amount owed at this time of about \$10,000. The officers of the lodge were R. J. Parrott, N. G.; H. C. Coe, V. G., and L. E. Morse, H. J. Hibbard and E. S. Mayes. The report shows that the total membership at this time was 113.

Kemp Lodge No. 181, of Odell; Parkdale Lodge No. 205, of Parkdale; Beacon Lodge No. 182, of Mosier, and Good Will lodge of White Salmon, Wn., are all offshoots of Idlewild lodge. When these various lodges were formed Idlewild lost several of its members, so the present membership of 180 members shows that Idlewild lodge has made a steady and healthy growth.

What About Mothers?

(By Frederick D. Stricker, M. D., collaborating epidemiologist of Oregon State Board of Health, in cooperation with the United States Public Health Service.) 154f

It has been said that to become a mother is more dangerous than to be a soldier in a front-line trench. While this is something of an exaggeration (particularly in states like Oregon, where the people live under good conditions) it does remind us that motherhood is a much more dangerous undertaking than it has any right to be. In 1924, in Oregon 108 mothers lost their lives in giving birth to children. It is certain that a large proportion of these deaths were unnecessary, and would not have occurred if the proper precautions had been taken. 154f

During the same year, 828 infants died. Many of them could have been saved. If their mothers had had a better understanding of their care, especially during sickness. Education of mothers and mothers-to-be would save many lives—both their own and their children's. For this reason, the bureau of child hygiene of the Oregon State Board of Health has prepared a series of letters to prospective mothers, which are sent monthly before the baby comes, and for four months thereafter. 154f

These letters take up, in a simple way, the things a mother should know and should do to prepare for her baby's coming. They advise her of the precautions she should take at various times, and what danger signals to look for. They tell her how to go about conserving her health, and that of her unborn child. The second series of letters give her pointers on taking care of the new baby, in the same way. 154f

Many expressions of appreciation have been received from women who received these letters and from their doctors. It does not seem to be generally known, however, that the letters are available. Physicians who have patients whom they would like the series sent to, should send the patient's name to the Bureau of Child Hygiene, State Board of Health, Portland. Prospective mothers who would like the letters should send a request to the same office. 154f

A selection of the best pamphlets and literature available on various subjects connected with the letters is sent out with the latter. There is no cost whatever connected with this service. 154f

Miss Elizabeth Quinn

News was received here last week of the death, in Seattle, of Miss Elizabeth Quinn, formerly well known Oregon teacher. Miss Quinn for a number of years taught primary grades in the local schools and for several years prior to and at the time of her death she was a primary teacher in Seattle city schools. 154f

Miss Quinn, who stood high in educational circles, had many friends in Hood River, who will remember her work and deeply regret her passing. Miss Quinn is survived by two brothers: Frank Quinn, of Seattle, and Oscar Quinn, of Streeter, Ill., and three sisters, Mary, Kate and Lucy Quinn, all of San Francisco. 154f
