

APPLE EXPORTS THIS
SEASON ARE HEAVY

According to records compiled by the traffic department of the Port of Portland, Oregon exports of apples recently have been heavy. The steamer Royal Star, of the Blue Star line, cleared October 29 with 74,417 boxes valued at \$218,223. November 2 the Narenta, of the Royal Mail Steam Packet company, cleared with 54,661 boxes valued at \$164,702, and November 4 the Pacific Trader, of the Furber line, cleared with 33,757 boxes valued at \$85,054, making a total of 162,835 boxes cleared during that week. The steamer Narenta, which cleared November 2, is the same steamer which cleared in December, 1922, with a cargo of 119,394 boxes, which is one of the record cargoes taken by a single vessel from the Port of Portland.

Shipments of apples during the 1924-25 season amounted to 1,105,285 boxes; for the 1923-24 season, 541,947 boxes; for the 1922-23 season, 600,207 boxes, and for the 1921-22 season, which was the first season that apples were exported direct from Portland, amounted to 444,984 boxes. Exports so far this season amount to 225,000 boxes with bookings which indicate that shipments this season will be heavier than last.

The steamer Narenta carried 10 cases of Oregon cranberries destined for London, one large box of Oregon walnuts for Salzburg, Austria, and prunes and candied goods in addition to the large cargo of apples mentioned before.

Radio to most of us is a means of getting news, music, education and enjoyment, by the air line. We recognize difficulties of the radio engineers and take what pleasure we can from the air. The settlement of the radio would be radio fans that radio at the price we pay should be perfected, and disappointment occurs.

Radio without tuning, without batteries, without break-downs, and without many annoying things is a dream. Yes we do dream, but the day when a perfect voice can be perfectly received across a continent is far, far away. Someone said that the only place we find perfection is in ourselves or in our children. The only radio set claimed to be perfect is the radio child of one of our local fans and we reserve judgment. When H. B. Read had radio trouble a wave of the hand and "that's radio" explained a lot. When we have trouble with radio the same appears and we often preserve a profane silence when blamed for poor construction of a manufactured set or the operator's unsuccessful attempts at set adjustments. It is becoming more and more necessary to insist on rugged construction and careful inspection of a radio set.

That salesman's boast of installing a set to operate a year without attention will soon be a requirement for purchase of a good set.

Trickle chargers have come to stay, and there are many buyers who are knocking. What's next? Who knows?

Hood River city schools cooperated with the National Bureau of Education, with the National Education Association and the American Legion in promoting the annual Education week. While each day had a special significance which was held by the teachers and pupils in their respective rooms, two days were particularly emphasized in the local schools. The first of these was Tuesday, Patriotism day, when the business and professional men of the club was served with lunch at the high school by the girls in the cooking class under the direction of Miss E. Swartz. A special assembly was called by Prin. Gibson, where the men and other visitors were entertained with the high school orchestra music, vocal selections by Miss Joyce Nye, a patriotic speech by Miss Elsie Lape and by an old fashioned negro minstrel put on by the boys' glee club.
