NEW ST. MARK'S CHURCH COMPLETED
Next Sunday will be a day of rejoicing among the members and friends of St. Mark's Episcopal church, for that day the first services will be held in the new church. The first service will be a celebration of the Holy Communion at 8 o'clock in the morning. Then the children will meet for the opening service of the church school for the new church, after which they will go to the adjoining rooms for their lessons. For some time the parish house has been used as a temporary church so that the children have been handicapped in their lesson work, but now they will have tables and lots of room. Following church school, at 11 o'clock there will be morning service and sermon. The rector will preach.

There is also room for a small chapel on the north side of the nave, to be built in the future.

Not only is it a building well adapted to the varied uses of modern church work, but it is one of great beauty, with its high trussed ceiling in the nave, its well proportioned chancel and attractive sanctuary. Worship will gain new reverence and beauty in the new St. Mark's church.
