Hot lunches were resumed last week in the high school, being prepared by Mrs. Sarah Neal assisted by some of the high school girls under the direction of the home economics department. These hot lunches are served daily at the price of 10 cents for each pupil. They are popular not only in the high school but in Junior high as well. These lunches consist sometimes of chocolate and sandwiches or salads with crackers and sometimes vegetable or other soups with sandwiches or salads and water. It is intended to fill 10 cents worth of value to be in these lunches and no profit is being made. Mrs. Neal's services are being paid for by the school district.
