Hood River Apples Condemned

Editor Glacier: Hood River worthy apples shipped into Portland markets and condemned by the fruit inspector have become a joke. Charitable institutions have received such heavy shipments which were condemned during the last 30 days that they refuse to accept any more as a gift. This statement can be verified by Mr. Wilcox, of your city, who is in a position to know. Hood River alone does not furnish this supply but it does furnish the largest percent of worthy fruit.

If the individual shipper who does have his fruit condemned was to have his name published you would then realize the great loss growers are taking, but nine out of every ten who lose fruit in this way ask the inspector as a special favor not to make their names known and they would be willing to stand the loss.

The horticultural department as well as the grower should be benefited when these conditions are known.

WOMAN DIES FROM TAKING STRYCHNINE

Nettie Churchill, aged 43, wife of A. E. Churchill, farmer in the Barrett district, committed suicide Thursday morning by taking strychnine. After taking the fatal dose she said to her young daughter, Effie, "I have something to tell you. Tell daddy I have taken strychnine." After informing the family the girl ran to a neighbor's house and called a doctor, but Mrs. Churchill died in convulsions before his arrival.

The woman had been despondent and threatened to take her life several times before, but seemed more cheerful than usual Wednesday, when she went to town and evidently purchased strychnine tablets used for killing rats, as some tablets were found in the house. The wrapper had been destroyed, probably to conceal the name of the drug store where she purchased the poison. She had vomited copiously during her convulsions and the physician collected some of this to analyze as he was unable to pump any of the contents of her stomach after her death.

The family came here last summer from Long Beach, Calif., and purchased a farm just east of the Barrett school.

The funeral was held Tuesday morning at the Anderson chapel and burial was held at Tidewide. The following children of the deceased were in attendance:

Churchill, Mrs. Lottie Rieks and Miss Pearl Churchill, Long Beach, Calif.; Mrs. Julia Dennis, Madison, Kans.; Wendon and Roy Churchill and Misses Effie, Hazel and Gladys Churchill, of Hood River. Two other children, Mrs. Dillman, of Eldorado, Kans., and Edgar Churchill, of Houston, Texas, were unable to come for the funeral.
