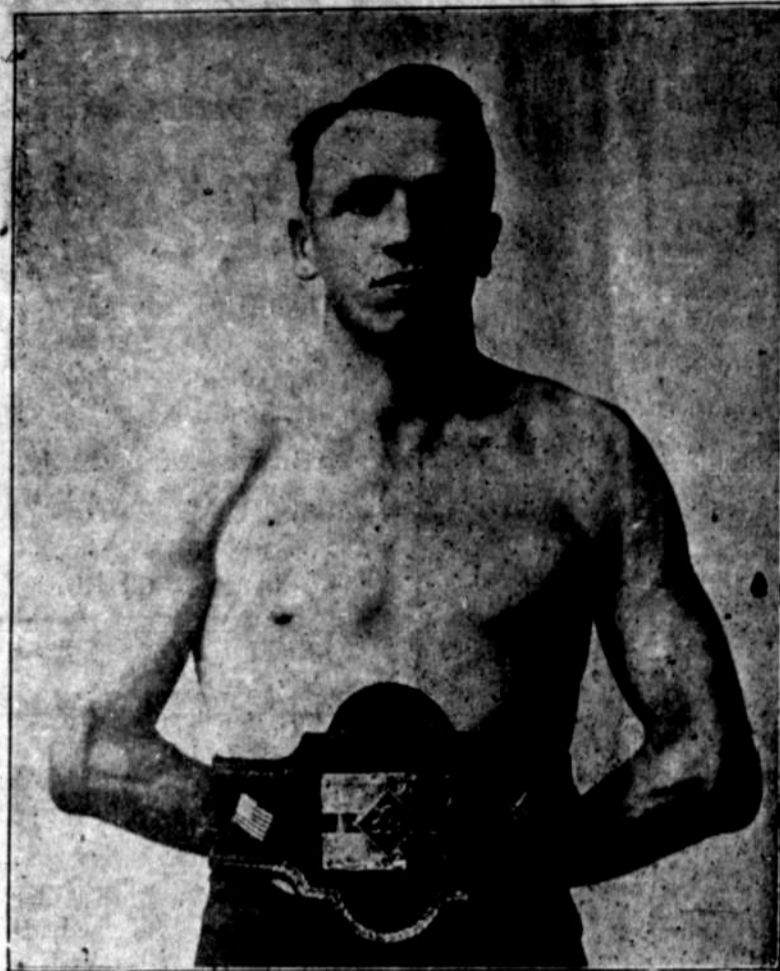
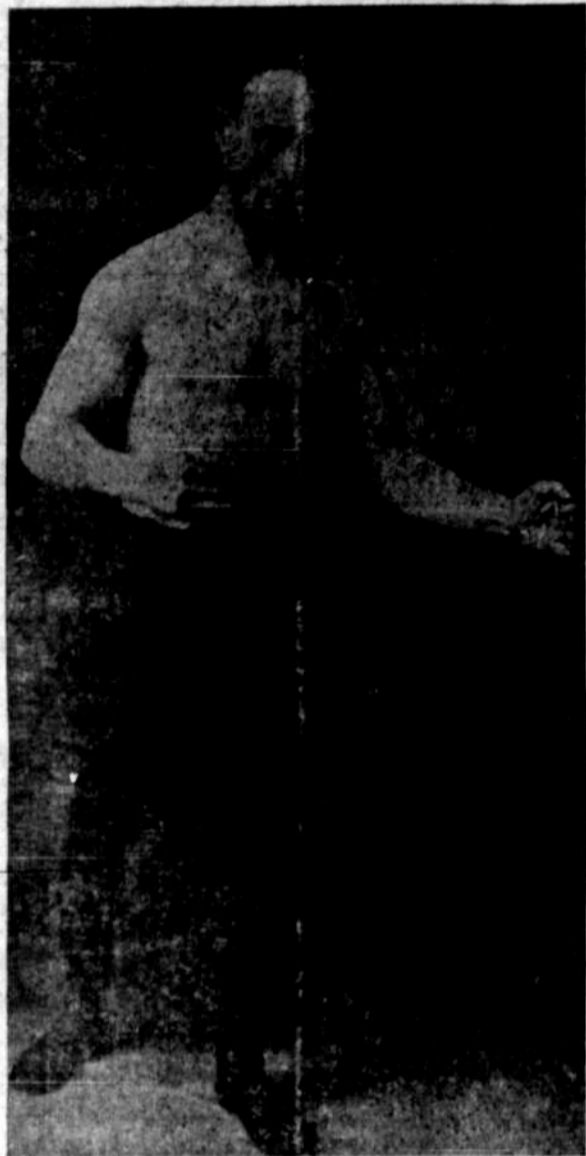

FIRE DAMAGE WILL BE REPAIRED SOON

Damage done to Science hall by the fire Thursday of examination week will be completely repaired in time for the opening of the second term January 4, announce O. A. C. authorities.

Authorization by the board of control for replacement of the loss was followed immediately by intensive repair work by a large crew which is tenting out the destroyed portions of the building and replacing them with new. Emergency orders have been placed with chemical and equipment concerns in order to have the necessary material on hand with which to supply the students. Indications are that these will arrive in time.

That the total loss did not exceed the \$25,700 shown by the detailed inventory is a matter of wonder to all who saw the progress of the fire, as early indications were that most of the building had been ruined.

Auto Registration Held Necessary
Secretary of State Koser has sent a letter to sheriffs and other peace officers of the state advising them not to issue temporary automobile licenses to owners whose cars have been previously licensed.

"When an applicant for a 1926 motor vehicle license presents himself to the sheriff with an application for such license," says the letter, "he must exhibit to the sheriff either a certificate of title or the certificate and receipt of registration issued at the time and in conjunction with such certificate of title as evidence that such motor vehicle owner has complied with the law requiring him to secure certificate of title for his motor vehicle."

The letter concludes with the statement that "motor vehicle car owners who are found operating their cars after January 1, 1926, and who have not made application for 1926 licenses will be doing so in violation of the motor vehicle law of the state and subject themselves to the penalties imposed thereunder for violations of such law."

Ashley Post Returned to Military Duty
Ashley Post, ex-National guard sergeant, who is now living in Portland, received what he said was one of his happiest Christmas presents in the form of notification from Brigadier-General White that he would be re-enlisted in the 82nd brigade on a full duty status.

Sergeant Post was discharged from the service several months ago, following the accident which cost him his right hand. This accident barred him from further military service unless special military authority for his re-enlistment could be obtained from the secretary of war. Such authorizations are given only in exceptional cases, and there are few precedents.
