NEW CLOUD CAP INN TO BE BUILT

Plans for a new hotel at Cloud Cap, northeast shoulder of Mt. Hood, were completed last week at a meeting of a committee of business men who are the present owners of the property. The committee has proposed to incorporate for \$250,000 and to raise \$100,000 of this amount at the present time by subscription. This sum will build the first unit of the structure which is to be of stone. Additional units will be added as needed. The first unit, as planned by F. E. Doyle, architect, will provide comparatively large dining and lounge rooms, so that the second unit may be devoted entirely to sleeping quarters. The design is a low rambling, one-story style, built to withstand strong winds.

Construction now of a hotel on Mt. Hood will be especially timely since the government road, connecting Cloud Cap with the Loop highway, is to be completed this year. This will make Cloud Cap a part of the Mount Hood Loop trip, linking the Columbia River highway, the Hood River valley and the Alpine scenery of Mount Hood. It will lengthen the trip from one to three days, since from Cloud Cap many side trips—to the summit of Mount Hood, to Eden park or Elliot glacier are easily available.

Railroads and travel bureaus have long advocated a hotel on Mount Hood to be advertised in the east, since an adequate hotel is all that is needed to attract tourists to the mountain.

The site of Cloud Cap compares very favorably with similar hotel sites in regard to altitude, view, distance from railroads, climate and proximity to Mt. Hood.

In a comparison of elevation of different mountain resorts, Cloud Cap inn shows as follows:

Peculiar Truck Accidents

Two peculiar motor truck accidents created a sensation here the past week. A huge truck, just arrived Saturday afternoon from Portland with a load of sheet steel, tumbled from the vehicle on Oak street and sliding down a steep grade over the slippery surface, grazed automobiles and demolished concrete curbing. The steel pieces, shaped to half-cylindrical form, destined for use in construction of gasoline storage tanks for the Union Oil Co., shifted as the truck passed over a bump in the street. The sharp ends of the heavy sheet steel shaved the truck stakes clean.

A truck of the Tum-A-Lum Lumber Co., carrying a load of fuel and long sheet steel chute, used for unloading, dropped the chute when it turned from Cascade avenue into Third street Monday afternoon. The metal apparatus was caught by a rear wheel, and the noise as terrific as though two freight trains had met in a head-on collision, emptied offices and stores.

Grandma Forsythe Passes

Mrs. Phyllis Forsythe, known generally here as "Grandma" Forsythe, died Thursday at a Portland hospital. Mrs. Forsythe, 84, came here in 1919 to become housekeeper for Col. and Mrs. W. F. Tucker at their home, El Corregidor, in the Upper Valley.

Several years ago the aged woman began to lose her sight and had gradually grown blind. Funeral services occurred at the crematorium at Milwaukie.

Tillamook Editor Goes to Florida

In a trip that rarely falls to a newspaper man, A. L. Mallory, editor and publisher of the Tillamook Headlight and president of the Oregon Editorial Association, left Portland last week for Florida on an unusual mission.

Charles D. Haines, former newspaper publisher, has wealth and lives in Florida. He has given 1,000 acres of land, said to be worth \$1,000,000, as an endowment to what he terms the International Press Foundation.

The presidents of the press associations in the various states, supplied in advance with transportation and expenses, are called to gather on the site of the proposed future meeting place of the newspaper men of the world.

The land is located about the center of Florida, north and south, and 18 miles from the eastern coast. The state presidents are to form an organization for administering the fund and to receive the trust imposed in the deed to them of the property.

Mr. Haines hopes the gift, by bringing the newspaper men of the world together on occasions, will forward the peace of the world and result in other reforms.
